Solid Waste and recycling collections to have different look spring '25

Columbus Junction's residential solid waste and recycling collections will look different next spring, following a decision by the city council at its Dec. 18 meeting to consolidate both programs under one contractor.

Currently, the two collections are handled by separate contractors, but the contracts will be expiring in March; and city officials said they felt putting them both under one contractor would make the services easier to manage and administer.

To facilitate the move to a single contractor, the council reviewed a 25-page Request for Proposal (RFP), which included a schedule for implementing a new collection program.

The RFP, which the council eventually agreed to follow, was developed by public works staffer Jeff Vonnahme.

Vonnahme said the process outlined in the RFP provided interested companies an opportunity to offer options, such as a cart system, if they wished.

Both he and Mayor Mark Huston told the council there had already been interest from companies because of the upcoming contract expirations.

"There has been some interest by others, so we'll open it up for them," Huston said before turning over the explanation on the RFP to Vonnahme, who said the council would maintain control over the contracting process.

"It will basically be the same thing we are doing now," he said, explaining the new contract would extend for three years, the same as the current agreements.

Under those contract, Iowa River Sanitation, Columbus Junction, provides the solid waste collection, while WEMIGA, Mt. Pleasant, operates the recycling program.

"No matter who puts a bid in, you can go with whoever you want. It's the city council's choice," Vonnahme assured the council.

The RFP will officially be available Jan. 1 with a Feb. 11 deadline for any questions that contractors may have. Proposals must be submitted to

Columbus School Board takes next steps in football field upgrade

A Jan. 23 bid letting and a Jan. 27 public hearing were both set by the Columbus School Board during its Dec. 16 meeting, as the next steps that will be taken in a planned upgrade of the school district's football (track/soccer) facility.

According to the motion approved by the board, the bid letting will be held at 2 p.m. at the district's administrative building, while the public hearing will be held as part of the board's regular January meeting that will begin at 6 p.m.

The proposed project has been under consideration for several years, although it has only been in the past few months the board has settled on some of the details.

According to previous discussions, the school board narrowed down its list of renovation alternatives to basically two options. The first proposal called for renovating the current football field/track complex using grass sod at an estimated cost of \$700,000. That proposal also carried a \$30,000 annual maintenance expense.

A financial analysis conducted by Piper Sandler, Des Moines, showed the first option could be completed using the district's available Physical Plant and Equipment Levy (PPEL) funding.

The second option called for replacing the grass sod with artificial turf at an estimated cost of \$1.65 million.

Both scenarios also

included installing a second long jump at one end of the football field, adding other track improvements at the opposite field end, track resurfacing, engineering and other planning work.

The school board voted at a Sept. 9 meeting to use the school's sales tax revenue to cover the cost. However, the resolution used in that action mentioned installing artificial turf; and although school officials said it did not commit the board to that option, local citizens became concerned.

A petition was apparently started seeking a vote on the issue; and at its Oct. 28 meeting, the school board voted to rescind that motion. It also confirmed plans to renovate the natural


