
Walt and Bev McGinnis went to funeral services for Jeremiah Murphy at the BPC church on Saturday morning.

Jerry and Peggy Overholser, Jeannette and Rodger Todd went to Toot-Toot's in Bethany for supper on Friday night.


Dan and Kathy Quick visited Berta Quick at the Estates on Sunday afternoon.

Ringgold County Board of Trustees

Ringgold County Hospital's Board of Trustees held a public hearing, Monday, April 22, for discussion on the budget for fiscal year July 2024 to June 2025.

With no public present for questions or comments the public hearing on the proposed budget was closed and the regular monthly meeting was opened.

Dr. Kate Wilcox started off the meeting with staff updates.

Denise Coleman has passed her emergency nurse certification and she is now certified for emergency medicine. Leah Nelson is scheduled to leave May 13 and her replacement Kassey Higdon, ARNP, will begin providing services May 7. Marcy Gregg has set her leaving date to the end of July (from previously announced September) and a replacement has been hired to start when Gregg leaves. This replacement will be named at a later date.

New to the staff on a temporary basis is Debbie Miner, filling the role of CFO and Megan Brown has been hired as an administrative assistant.

Rounding out the list of changes, Wilson added Courtney Hall, one of the PA's providing ER medicine, will be resigning at the end of July.

Amy Mobley, CCO, shared the minutes from last month's quality meeting and noted the annual Daisy Award ceremony will be held on May 8th. Nominations are still being accepted to honor one nurse, with the winner to be selected on Monday, May 6. The board of trustees is invited to attend the ceremony.

Sandra Christensen, Mercy Network liaison, began the financial report discussion with looking at the fiscal year 2024 bud-

She emphasized the importance of the "not to exceed number" set and outlined a summary of RCH debt obligation which includes all bonds and the requirement to maintain a 60 day base and a 1.25 debt service coverage per-

Christensen also discussed the new Iowa Medicaid Direct Payment Program (DPP).

Medicaid is currently a joint funding program, with federally matched dollars that the state funds. All hospitals in Iowa are now contributing to this fund including RCH and with the exception of the University of Iowa Hospitals, who have their own funding program. Funds are distributed on a quarterly basis. The first quarter distribution was received in March. This is a new program which is intended to impact cash

The base of the budget being proposed for county tax budget came up with an increase.

New to the budget year is the Medicaid provider tax which will match a couple million dollars. Cash flow, 1.9 EBIDA is projecting just under \$2M cash generated in this next

expenditures Capital show \$500,000 for routine expenditures, \$760,000 for next year are the annual amounts through the great western bonds RCH is currently capped at. Christensen explained these capped amounts can be changed.

As far as available cash budgeted for 2024-2025, \$2.7M net cash is projected for 2024.

RCH books are currently sitting with about 100 days cash on hand. The projected amount should bring up those days to 135-138 total days cash on hand for 2025 and an anticipated 170 in 2026. If the direct payment program were to stop it would impact the length of time to get cash on hand to the number required or pre-

Regarding the county tax levy, valuations for Ringgold county property only went up about \$1M between 2024 and 2025.

The budget proposes a 3.69 tax levy, which is basically no change from the previous year. The total asking is about \$1.5M.

Christensen concluded the budget looked like "a good foundation for strategic planning" and sug-
