All-Inclusive Playground opens at Cedar River Park

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More than 50 people - many of them kids - attended a grand opening of the Cedar River Park All-Inclusive Playground on Saturday, April 26.

The community has been making good use of the All-Play Playground since it opened in December at Cedar River Park, according to Waverly Leisure Services Director Garret Riordan.

"I think every day that I drove by that it was over 50 degrees, there was half a dozen cars out here with people out here playing," Riordan said.

Past Mayor Dean Soash echoed the popularity of the inclusive playground.

"I drive this several times a week," Soash said. "As Garret said, there's kids here, and the wonderful thing is, the majority of them are probably 6 or 7 years old and younger. It's something that, regardless of physical abilities, they can handle and have fun with, as opposed to some of the large equipment that's in some of the other parks. It's absolutely

Riordan said he was happy with the turnout Saturday.

"One of the major things for this playground is that it offers a chance for kids of all ages, all abilities to come together, play, interact, meet new people, and a chance for everyone to have fun," Rior-

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A text too late: Wapsie Valley stages mock car crash Thursday

"It was more real than I thought," Dallas Tisue said Thursday as the fake blood still dotted his head after the mock car

Wapsie Valley High School held a simulated car crash for students to raise awareness of distracted driving and the potential catastrophic impacts to friends, students and other drivers. With collaboration among the Bremer County Sheriff's Office, Iowa State Patrol, Oran, Fairbank and Readlyn First Responders, Kaiser-Corson Funeral Home and the Wapsie Valley FFA, the car crash was rather real to some viewers of the event. "This is the first time that we had the

mock car crash at Wapsie Valley for five or six years now, and we saw a need to host this at our school due to unsafe driving practices by our students, unfortunately," said FFA Advisor Carmen Wille. "The kids have put a lot of time and planning into it... They really saw the importance with this, so they wanted to go through with it."

Since February, organizers have been working with local responders, the fu-





neral home and community members to put on the event that is hosted every five years at the school. Two cars were sourced following crashes of their own and were used as props with makeup done by a volunteer from a local EMS

department.

The victims included Tisue, LeeAnn Oltrogge, Eric Bryan, Mae Wedemeier and Lane Shores. Oltrogge was pronounced "dead" at the mock scene, a

County sets budget after removing wage study

Countywide levy is \$177 on \$150,000 home, \$307 with rural services

The Bremer County Board of Supervisors made one change to the budget for the year ending June 30, 2026, after a public hearing on Tuesday, April 22.

They reduced funds allocated for a wage study after hearing Iowa Workforce Development was going to do the study at no charge. The change was not expected to reduce the tax levy any further.

Kassandra Johnson, county finance director, detailed the levy

The Bremer County-wide levy is being reduced to \$5.23 and change (5.23465), from \$5.55 and change (5.54862) per \$1,000 assessed valuation, which is tantamount to a reduction of 31.4 cents per \$1,000 assessed.

The rural areas, which pay a higher levy than countywide be-
