the sixth inning, then I gave up a walk to lose that. Then the next kid got a hit so I lost my no-hitter, too. But after that I settled back in again and struck out the side.”

Harrington was so completely dominant, Calamus-Wheatland batters even struggled merely making contact against the superstar Midland hurler.

“The only two balls in play that were recorded outs were a pop-up to Anthony in foul territory and sacrifice bunt that Anthony fielded and threw over to first,” Soper said. “We swung the bats better this time around as we had some timely hitting. We hit well against a solid pitcher from Cal-Wheat, too.”

Midland (5-8, 5-3) started the scoring in the top of the very first inning as Avery Kennicker drove home Harrington with an RBI single to get the visitors on the board.

The Eagles added three more runs in the top of the fourth when Corbin Eganhouse drew a bases loaded walk that plated teammate Grady Sauer before a Harrington single plated Ashton Boge. Ballou followed with another RBI single that scored Carter Otte, and the visitors extended their lead to 4-0.

Harrington helped himself in the top of the sixth working a walk then after stealing second, scored thanks to another Kennicker RBI single.

Harrington lost his shutout bid in the bottom of the sixth when Calamus-Wheatland plated a single run to end the scoring in the contest.

Harrington finished the mind-boggling contest throwing 102 pitches overall allowing a mere one Warrior hit and walked three from the mound while he also was 2-of-2 at the plate with two

walks and two runs scored.

“It was actually my mom who told me I had 20 strikeouts in the game,” Harrington said. “I’m not sure any of my teammates or anybody knew exactly how many strikeouts I had. The one thing we did know was that I had a lot.”

Ironically, the record-setting performance almost never happened.

“Before the game I didn’t even know for sure if I was going to pitch,” Harrington said. “My shoulder was hurting a little, but I felt good once on the mound and was mixing up my pitches well, too.

“It’s tough for me to put into words what exactly I accomplished. Honestly, I was more focused on the perfect game and the no-hitter more than piling up all the strikeouts.”

Midland looked to complete the Tri-Rivers Conference sweep in the nightcap with the Warriors, but were instead handed a tough 14-1 loss that ended in five-innings.

“Cal-Wheat had a 12-run third inning and that was pretty much it,” Soper said. “There were some plays that

could have been made behind Ashton Boge and C.J. Brodersen, but they weren’t. Cal-Wheat also hit several balls in places where we did not have a defender. Credit C.J. and Ashton though. They threw a lot of strikes and competed hard. We were just a victim of something that happens at times in baseball with that being a long inning and well-placed hits by the opponent.”

The Warriors plated single runs in the first and second innings before the big outburst in the third while the Eagles plated their lone run in the top of the fourth when Kennicker plated Harrington with an RBI single.

Harrington and Kennicker tallied the lone hits in the contest for the hosts while both Boge and Brodersen worked two frames on the mound.

Midland returned home Thursday, June 19, and against a solid East Buchanan team came out on the short end of an 8-1 score with the Buccaneers.

“We did not swing the bats well again,” said Soper, as his team was limited to six hits overall.

“We had too many uncompetitive at-bats to be success-

ful as we had seven strikeouts looking. Credit East Buchanan, they are a talented team and their pitcher attacked the strike zone and did not give us many free passes.”

The Buccaneers plated two runs in the top of the second inning to break a scoreless tie before adding three more in the third to take a 5-0 lead. A single run in the fourth extended the East Buchanan advantage to 6-0 before a Kennicker RBI double plated Harrington with the Eagles’ lone run in the game in the bottom of the fourth.

The visitors closed the scoring coming through with two runs in the fifth.

“Avery has been hitting the ball really well,” Soper said. “We have not improved offensively like we thought we would be at this point in the season. We struggle stringing hits together and struggle putting the ball in play with runners in scoring position. If you were a fan, you would think that we don’t work on things such as two-strike approaches and situational hitting, etc., but we do. We have a long ways to go.”

Kennicker powered a six-hit Midland offense going

3-for 3 at the plate while Harrington, Ballou and Sauer all came through with hits as well.

The Eagles looked to get things turned around the very next night, but dropped a 12-2 decision Friday, June 20, against a talented team from Durant.

“Another night where the bats struggled only collecting three hits in the ballgame,” Soper said. “I thought we competed harder than we did the night before against East Buchanan, but Durant is a talented team, who had several solid arms to throw against our guys.

“We need to keep getting better so we can be in a right spot when it becomes post-season time.”

Midland scored their first run in the first inning when Ballou drove home Eganhouse with an RBI ground out before Harrington singled home Xander Eldred in the fifth inning.

Ballou got the pitching start and worked the game’s first two frames before giving way to Corbyn Brodersen and Otte as the trio combined to strikeout seven Wildcat batters in the game.

The Jones County Board of Supervisors met in regular session. Present Chairman Schlarmann, Supervisors Hall, Oswald, Swisher, and Zirkelbach.

Prior to the start of the meeting, the Treasurer introduced new Motor Vehicle Deputy, Beth Steuri.

Moved by Zirkelbach seconded by Oswald to approve the minutes of the June 3, 2025 meeting. All aye. Motion carried.

Moved by Swisher seconded by Hall to approve payroll for the period ending June 1, 2025, as certified by the department heads. All aye. Motion carried.

The Auditor met with the Board for approval of the various items as noted in the motions below, to give an update on the courthouse bathroom, and to seek input on when the MOU with the East Central Region should be put back on the agenda.

Moved by Swisher seconded by Hall to approve contract numbers DCAT-SA426023 and DCATSA426024 with Iowa Department of Health and Human Services for DECAT project coordination services and CPPC coordination services and to require the DECAT board to follow Jones County employment notice posting requirements. All aye. Motion carried.

Moved by Oswald seconded by Hall to approve a revision to the underground electric line easement with Interstate Power and Light Company along the Olin Section of the Grant Wood Trail. All aye. Motion carried.

Moved by Zirkelbach seconded by Swisher to change the Public Safety Storage Facility bid letting time to Tuesday, June 17, 2025, at 2 p.m. All aye. Motion carried.

Moved by Oswald seconded by Hall to change the Public Safety Storage Facility public hearing to Tuesday, June 24, 2025 at 9:00 a.m. All aye. Motion carried.

Supervisor Swisher introduced the following resolution and moved its adoption, seconded by Supervisor Zirkelbach. On roll call vote: Zirkelbach aye, Hall aye, Swisher aye, Oswald aye, Schlarmann aye, whereupon the Chairman declared the resolution passed and adopted.

RESOLUTION CREATING AN

EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM FUND

WHEREAS, in July 2008, Jones County, the City of Anamosa, the City of Monticello, and the City of Cascade formed the Jones County Emergency Response Team (JCERT) through a 28E Agreement;

WHEREAS, Delaware County joined JCERT in October 2022;

WHEREAS, JCERT accounts are currently being maintained by the City of Anamosa and the JCERT Executive Board wishes Jones County to start maintaining the funds;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Auditor shall create an agency fund for the purpose of maintaining revenues and expenditures for JCERT. Said fund shall be called the JCERT Fund 4132. All interest accrued by this fund shall be attributed back to the fund. This is a non-budgetary fund in which the JCERT Executive Board holds the spending authority of all monies within this fund.

Moved by Swisher seconded by Zirkelbach to approve order request for a new JETS bus in the amount of \$187,436.00. All aye. Motion carried.

The Engineer met with the Board for approval of a Federal-Aid Agreement for a County Highway Bridge Program Project on Stone City Road, to give updates on the X31 culvert replacement project and to discuss the upcoming retirement of a staff member.

Moved by Oswald seconded by Hall to approve a Federal-Aid Agreement for a County Highway Bridge Program Project on Stone City Road over Crow Creek. Project No. BROS-CO53(102)-5F-53. All aye. Motion carried.

The Board gave brief updates on past and future committee meetings.

During the elected official comment period, the Sheriff informed the Board that the Jail Administrator has given notice of resignation but will continue to work until a replacement is found.

Moved by Swisher seconded by Hall to adjourn the meeting at 9:54 a.m. All aye. Motion carried.
