Celebrate July 4-5 Heritage Days

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More than 100 years ago, the river community celebrated what was called "Bellevue Homecoming." For more than six decades, it has been known as Heritage Days.

Same concept, different name, yet the annual patriotic gala draws thousands each year from across the tri-state area and far beyond as it is one of the largest and most action-packed Independence Days celebrations in eastern Iowa, and definitely the biggest party in Jackson County by far.

Now in its 63rd year, Bellevue's Independence Day celebration will take place Friday July 4, and Saturday, July 5. The event will include live music, dances, kids games, food, refreshments, ski shows, fireworks displays and of course, the grand parade.

All the fun starts Friday, July 4, at Cole Park with H&H Fun Rides opening for kids at 4 p.m. Inflatables, climbing rock wall, "Tubs of Fun" ride and foam machine are all available. Ron Moraga caricatures and Henna's Temporary Tattoos will also be on site. An outdoor dance in the beer garden featuring local band 50 Pound Rooster begins at 5:30 p.m., with Not Quite Brothers from 9 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. Food vendors including Parker's Pit Stop, Jeronimo's, Schlect Lunch Wagon and Sip & Shop and Sweet Boutique also will be on hand.

At dusk, the music will be paused as Bellevue American Legion Post #273 members conduct a traditional flag burning at Cole Park. A youth dance with tunes provided by Absolute Music will also take place from 8 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. Meanwhile down at the American Legion Hall on Market Street, live music will be provided by the One-of-a-Kind Band.

On Saturday, July 5, the day begins at 10 a.m. with the Heritage Days Parade, with parade line-up at the Horizon Hall parking lot at about 9:15 a.m. Floats are asked to register either online or at Bellevue City Hall in order to officially be part of the Float Contest, sponsored by the Bellevue Chamber of Commerce. First and second place winners will receive a payout of \$500 and \$250 in Chamber Bucks. (Those floats not entering the contest can simply line up at Horizon Hall).

Bellevue organizes the largest July 4 party in the area, with a parade, fireworks, and two-days of festivities to entertain people of all ages. This year's events will be July 4-5.

Food stands, bingo, children's games and a beer garden and car and tractor show will be open all day. From 12:45 p.m. to 2 p.m., youth dances will take place at the Cole Park basketball courts, as well a sanctioned pedal tractor pull for children ages 4-12.

Live music in the beer garden will commence at noon in the beer garden with a performance by veteran musician and one of the original "rhythm boys" Jeffy Theisen at noon, followed by River Moonshine at 2:30 p.m. and the Pork Tornados from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

H&H Fun Rides and a 24-foot rock-climbing wall will be available for the kiddos, as well as Schroeder's Crew Petting Zoo (featuring our local FFA and 4-Hers). Miller Cornhole games will also be located on the outer softball diamond starting at 3 p.m., and T.J. the Quad City Magician will be making balloon animals and performing magic for all.

The Bellevue Chamber Cash Raffle, with drawings for \$15,000, \$3,000 and \$1,000, will take place at 7 p.m. in the beer garden.

Downtown activities, fireworks

Down on South Riverview, food trucks aplenty will be available starting at 4 p.m. A live ski show by Ski Bellevue will commence at 6 p.m.

The fireworks display over the Mississippi River will take place at dusk on Saturday night. The fireworks display is coordinated by the Bellevue Fire Department. Fireworks are paid for by business and individual donations, as well as from the proceeds from the Bellevue Heritage Days button sales, which allow admission to most events.
