Activities begin at 10:00 a.m. Among the activities are several craft stations for children, including painting a pumpkin, make a craft or make a jump rope, a Scarecrow photo booth or win a sweet treat in the cake

Would you like to learn how things were made years ago? There will be several people demonstrating almost forgotten crafts. Try your hand at weaving a rug on the loom with the help of Joan Byrns. Mark Snook will help you make a jump rope on a vintage rope making machine.

Local Area Farm Families Recognized at The Iowa State Fair for Heritage and Century Farms

The Heritage Farm Program recognizes Ownership and operation of a farm by members of the same family for one hundred and fifty years or more is a significant accomplishment. The Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship in conjunction with the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation established the Heritage Farm Program for farm families that have owned at least 40 acres for 150 years or more.

The Century Farms Program recognizes and honors those individuals who have owned the farm land for 100 years or more. The program began in 1976 as part of the Bicentennial Celebration, when nearly 5,000 certificates and farm markers were distributed across Iowa at local ceremonies.
