West Branch Roofing gave Brad an estimate to complete repairs to the main building roof. Brad is waiting on a price from Brockway Mechanical

Brad will contact Springsteen Tiling to discuss some options for drainage around the building.

Board Policy Review – Superintendent Peterson reviewed the policies for review in this month's review cycle with the board.

Superintendent Peterson noted that he found no changes necessary to the above-board policies. Greiner moved, seconded by Lomeli, to approve reviewing them. The motion carried with a 5-0 voice vote.

Old and New Business:

Daycare Update - Superintendent Peterson gave the board an update on the latest happenings with the Tiny Tigers Daycare. Payton reported that things are going well, she has been able to hire some additional help. If the daycare stays in the elementary classroom, an exterior door would need to be added. The latest communication from DHS and the State Fire Marshal indicated that if a plan were in place to add this door within the next 1-2 years, that

would be acceptable. Fire exit signs will need to be installed, along with a sink and bathroom, depending on the final location of the daycare.

The board's consensus was to move forward with a plan of using the room that the daycare is currently in and finding out the specifics of what will need to be done to comply with HHS and Fire Marshal requirements. Payton will also find out the specific requirements for adding a bathroom.

4th of July Update - Beth Shenpolk - Beth Shenpolk gave the board an update on the July 4th holiday plans.

Maintenance Director Job Description - Superintendent Peterson brought to the board the proposed development of a job description for the Maintenance Director/Head Custodian.

Superintendent Peterson and the board will work on a document to be refined in the coming months.

Summer Custodial Help – Supt. Peterson discussed with the board the possibility of hiring some student summer help for the custodial crew, there was no action taken at this time until a more detailed list of projects could be developed.

Playground Discussion with the City of Morning Sun – Supt. Peterson updated the board on his meeting with the Morning Sun City Council regarding the playground. Supt. Peterson will work on a proposed 28E Agreement to present to the city at a future meeting with city officials.

Removal of Unhealthy Trees – Supt. Peterson will work with Brad and have some tree experts come in and take a look at the trees that are currently on the school property to see if any additional trees need to be addressed.

Additional Insurance Coverage for Wind and Hail - School Business Official Eric Small walked the board through a new 28E and Chapter 670 Risk Pool that is being formed throughout the state to deal with rising deductibles on Wind/Hail Claims on school facilities. Currently, the district's facilities are valued at just over \$15,300,000 and carry a 1% deductible. If a significant wind or hail storm damaged the facilities, the district would need to come up with \$153,000 in deductible funds to repair the damage. By joining this new risk pool, the district can

buy down its exposure to a \$10,000/ storm deductible for wind and hail claims as shown in this detailed breakdown from Jester Insurance. There was a motion by Greiner and seconded by Malone to approve participation in the Iowa Schools Storm Risk Pool. The motion carried with a 5-0 voice vote. T

Approval of Sharing Agreement for SBO and Modification for HR Director - With the retirement of Kim Hagge-Buster, the district needs to name a permanent School Business Official. There was a proposal that was shared with the board to share the SBO with Wapello at 40% FTE. There was also a proposal to increase the sharing of the HR Director from 20% to 40%. There was a motion by Greiner and seconded by Lomeli to enter into a 28E Agreement with the Wapello Community School District for Operational Sharing of the SBO and HR Director at 40%. The district will save approximately \$9,605 in personnel costs and gain an additional \$32,000 in Operational Sharing Incentives from the state. The motion carried with a 4-0-1 Voice Vote. (Malone abstained)

Media Center for 2025-2026 - Superintendent Peterson presented a revised service agreement with Great Prairie AEA for 15 days of on-site work from an AEA Librarian. There are a few other possibilities for librarian services, Superintendent Peterson will look into those further, but felt the AEA needs to know soon, whether or not the district would like to contract with them for their services. There was a motion by Greiner and seconded by Lomeli to approve the 2025-2026 Service Agreement with Great Prairie AEA for a Librarian, if the other options do not materialize. The motion passed with a 5-0 voice vote.

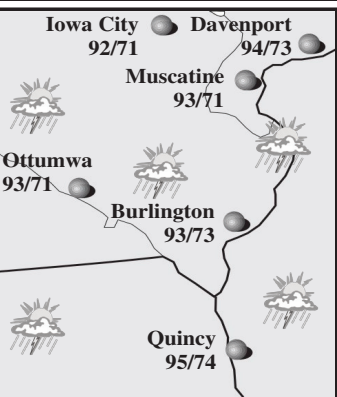
Detailed Local Forecast

StarWatch By Gary Becker - Lag of the Seasons

The summer solstice has passed. Currently, the days are shortening by a minuscule amount. Nevertheless, the descent towards winter has already begun. The sun's downward slide will continue to accelerate through July and August until the autumnal equinox on September 22, when the duration of night and day becomes essentially equal, then interchanges as the sun's southward movement begins to decelerate until the winter solstice on December 21. It seems as if summer or more temperate conditions linger for a more extended period than they should, and in reality, they do. In the morning when I make scrambled eggs for breakfast and turn on the electric burner to melt the butter in which the eggs will be fried, the pan does not become instantly hot. It takes a minute or so for the butter to liquify, before I can begin the cooking process. Likewise, I would be a fool to put my hand on the glass cover over which I had just cooked the eggs, even five or ten minutes after I turned off the stove because it takes time for the infrared energy (heat) to dissipate on the stovetop. * Instead of thinking that our planet is the heat source, consider the Earth as the frying pan and the sun as the heat source. Yes, the Earth has a molten outer core and an inner core that is hotter than the Sun's photosphere from which light escapes; however, the thick mantle and crust conduct very little of that energy to the surface. On top where we live, the heat source that governs temperature, weather, ocean currents, and ultimately climate is a function of the external energy supplied by the sun. The Northern Hemisphere just passed the summer solstice, the moment in time when we experienced the maximum insolation (energy input) from the sun, yet our daytime high temperatures are nowhere near what they will become near the end of July when statically they are at a maximum. Up until that time, we receive more energy from the sun than we release during our shorter nights that occur within our daily rotational period under the sun's influence...
