# DC Genealogy Society searches for a new home

The Davis County Genealogy Society has been housed in the Old Elementary Building for 12 years, but recently learned it would be losing its home and must relocate.

The old school building was recently sold and the new owner will be shutting off utilities in the three-story wing early next year.

Genealogy Society officers Vicki Houk, Pat Howk, and Sue Spilman met with the Bloomfield Democrat last week to discuss the dilemma and put out a plea for public help in locating a suitable space for the historical treasures they are trying to preserve.

Looking around the former third-grade classroom that is now filled with documents and photographs, it quickly became obvious a climate-controlled space of around 600 square feet or more would be needed to preserve and allow accessibility to these treasures. The facility would need to be handicapped accessible and have access to toilet facilities.

The Genealogy Society is currently housing:

 many volumes of bound Bloomfield Newspapers.

 transcribed correspondence including a set of 100 books titled "War of Rebellion." This collection includes letters and diary entries from the Civil War Era.

 volumes of family histories that have been donated including the Sloan Bowling, Veatch, Houk, Howk, Latta, Gandy,

McReynolds, Taylor, Steckel, and Glassburner families. "We're always accepting more of these." Howk said.

 plat books from scattered years going back to 1875.

old land maps.

 maps showing the locations of country schools.

• maps of cemetery locations.

• old eighth grade graduation records from Davis County's country schools.

 directories for country schools, student names and attendance records, teachers' names, and board members.

• Dee Altheide's book of school records.

 vearbooks from the 1920s on.

· files of family research. (After doing research for families, the ladies make a copy of everything before sending information back to the requestor.)

• boxes of old photographs. (One of these boxes came from the Pulaski Mennonite community).

· microfilm of historical records.

probate notices.

The Genealogy Society has a couple of computers for public research and a subscription to ancestry. com for family research. Newspapers.com is also available at no charge as well as links to Advantage Archives for Appanoose and Wapello County Newspapers for research.

Of course, the Bloomfield Democrat's archives, https://bloomfield. historyarchives.online/ home, is also available.

"We have knowledgeable staff working a couple days a week to help people do the research and locate the informa-

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tion they are looking for," Howk said.

The Genealogy Society is currently open from 1-4 p.m. on Thursdays and Fridays. The women said the public may make appointments at other times by calling 641-777-4606 (Vicki Houk), 641-208-3161 (Pat Howk), or 641-664-2223 (Sue Spilman).

The women said the Society also needs more members and financial support. Membership is currently about 25 people, but used to be around 75-80. Annual dues for the organization are \$17.50.

Expenses include rent, internet money, and possibly utilities.

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# Register status

The above plaque was installed on the exterior wall of the Bloomfield Public Library last week after being requested by Library Director Anne Tews and approved by the Library Board of Directors. The library was named to the National Register of Historic Places in 2015, but signage had never been erected. 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
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
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
