Mary Luffy, Davis County High School senior, was asked to serve as a student representative to the Davis County School Board this fall and

attended her first meeting in November. The board discussed the possibility of adding the non-voting position last school year, and this year Luffy was added to the board upon the recommendation of DCHS Principal Derek Phillips. Phillips prepared Luffy for the position by acquainting her with board policies and previewing the topics the board might be discussing. “He said I would be there mostly to advocate

for the students and give insights on daily life inside the high school,” she commented. As board representative, Luffy will set up meetings with student groups to keep them informed of school board decisions. Luffy is a top student — she scored 30 on her ACT test last year — and is involved in band, choir, Drama Club, Quiz Bowl and takes IHCC college classes. She also works part-time at J’s One Stop.

so young, he worked on his requirements for three years instead of the year and a half it normally takes. There’s a minimum of 40 hours of flight time required but Proctor had about 140 hours in by the time he was finally old enough to be certified. Besides flying with an instructor, Proctor also had to complete solo flights as well. At 16, he earned his student pilot certificate which allowed him to fly alone so that he could meet his solo flight requirements. When asked if it was scary to fly alone in the beginning, Proctor responded, “It’s a different feeling. I don’t know that

I’d call it scary, but it’s really a unique feeling when you’re just by yourself. You’re the sole manipulator of the controls, and there’s no one to save you if you do something wrong; you’ve got to rely on your training.” Now that he has a private pilot certification, he can fly airplanes under 12,500 pounds, alone or with passengers without compensation. He elaborated, “The private pilot certificate allows you to fly on good weather days for your own personal pleasure.” Now he is working on earning his instrument

certificate which will allow him to fly in clouds or low visibility weather. Once he turns 18, he can get a commercial pilot’s certificate to fly for hire. From there he can earn multi-engine certificates and flight instructor certificates. After graduation, Proctor is thinking about going into the Air Force Academy with an end goal of flying fighter jets. He said, “I’d like to go into the Air Force ultimately, but the corporate aviation world sparks an interest in me. So, I’m not for sure exactly.”
