

TRUMP CALLS FOR INVESTIGATION OF U.S. MEAT **PACKERS**

President Donald Trump called on the U.S. Department of Justice to investigate the nation's four largest meat packers — JBS, Cargill, Tyson Foods and National Beef-for possible collusion, price fixing and price manipulation.

The four firms now control 85% of U.S. cattle purchases, up from 36% in 1980, sparking concerns about reduced competition. In a statement, the White House said the investigation "will root out any illegal collusion, restore fair competition and protect our food security."

Attorney General Pam Bondi said Assistant Attorney General Abigail Slater and USDA Secretary Brooke Rollins will lead the probe.
