might not personally agree with. Everyone has a right to his/her own opinions, but it's important to remember that there's a time and place to share them. Unfortunately, in a small town where nearly everyone knows everyone, each of us represents our place of business or our organization whether we realize it or not. Public comments, especially on social media, can impact the community and the workplace, so we need to think about the bigger picture and how our words could be perceived and how they affect those around us, A board/council member must remember that the good of the community must come before personal opinions and grievances.

KATIE SPARROW Candidate for City Council

1. Please tell us a little bit about y o u r s e l f and your ties to the community. If you could ttach a h e a d s h o t that would be great!



My name is Katie Sparrow, and for the past eight years, Columbus Junction has truly become my home. I am engaged to Bill Bright, and together we are raising a blended family of six wonderful boys-my sons Garrett (22) and Ethan (20), and Bill's sons Logan (21), Jase (10), and Andrew (31), who lives in Georgia. Originally from Salem, IA, and a proud 1997 graduate of Mt. Pleasant Community High School, I have grown deeply invested in the unique spirit of this community. Columbus Junction is not just where I live—it is where I want to help build an even stronger, more vibrant future for all of us. My commitment is to work tirelessly to make our city a place where every family can thrive, every child feels safe, and every resident feels proud to call home.

2. What are the top three things that need fixed/addressed with in our city? What do you think is currently going well in our community?

The top 3 things that I feel need to be addressed are 1) The streets, and not just that they are long overdue for repaving, but also the speed of traffic on 2nd, Gamble, and Colton. These streets have been turned into drag strips by many people, and with the number of children that walk to and from school and that just live on these streets, I feel we need to figure out a better way to slow

people down, whether it is better patrolling of these streets, or digital speed signs added, and also I would like to see that our streets get cleaned up as the downtown area and even the curbs of the other streets could all use a good cleaning, with our street sweeper. 2) The status of the waterlines throughout all of Columbus Junction, this last spring, early summer when we had a number of waterline breaks and areas went days without water, I want to know more about the stability of the remainer of the lines, and when were main waterlines last replaced, and become more proactive at replacing them before we have another major break, I know this is not always possible, however it is something I want to research more about so something like this last break doesn't happen, or at least we can be more prepared if does happened again. 3) Better communication and transparency between the City Council, City Hall, and the people of the Columbus Community. 4) One other thing I would like to work on is building up the downtown, finding ways to bring in businesses to fill empty storefronts on Main Street, and working with the community to beautify all areas of town, in whatever way I can.

3. What are the most pressing issues currently facing the success of our city?

I feel that there are several pressing

issues that are affecting the success of Columbus Junction. One of the top concerns that I've heard from almost everyone in CJ is the condition of our streets. I understand we are dealing with the detour, but it shouldn't sound like vehicles colliding every time cars and/or semis drive down some of these streets. We need to be more proactive before the next detour in the spring, because our city streets cannot handle another 5/6 months of all the same traffic.

4. If elected, what are the priority issues you would want to address during your term?

The condition of our streets, our waterlines, and also understanding the city finances, and looking at what we can do to put more money into the community to help draw in businesses downtown.

5. One of our communities' strengths is our diversity. What are some ways to continue to incorporate the diversity of our community.

The diversity in Columbus Junction is something that I truly love about living here. I would love to look into and work with community members on what different things we can do to better integrate everyone together.

6. Communication is very important and the perception that our council is not very

transparent with community members. How can you change that perception moving forward? What are some ways to improve the communication process?

I want people in the community to know that I am always available to hear from them. I will create an email that anyone within the community can use to reach out and contact me when they have concerns or questions. I am a very approachable person and am someone who wants to help, and if being on City Council and speaking up for those who don't feel comfortable speaking in front of others, I want to be their voice. I think that when people move into a smaller community, they see that if you weren't born or raised there, you don't always feel like you have a voice, and I want people to know that I can be that voice for them and help make a difference in Columbus Junction.

7. Can you explain where the money to fund our town comes from? What are your budget priorities?

Our city generates a significant portion of its income from property taxes, sales & use taxes, and monthly utility bills. I want to look at our city budget and see where we sit on where else our income is possibly coming from, and also, are we collecting past due utility bills, are we collecting everything we should, and utilizing our income the best way possible, or otherwise we might be missing out on possible income we could be/ should be receiving.

8. What role should the community play in supporting our school district and the education of our children?

I think that our community does a great job of supporting our school district. This has been a rather difficult fall season for our football team, but in the past, I think our community has always shown up for all sports, musical, and theatrical performances for our kids, which I think is amazing!!

9. How do you, as a board member, feel about negative comments from either employees or teachers about the city or school which you are employed at on Facebook for all to see?

I have always felt that no matter what your position at any company is, when you decide to speak ill of your employer or make negative comments on any online platform, you should be prepared for any consequence that comes from it. Some things are better dealt with in private and not shared with the world.
