Fairfield Renaissance Faire triples its attendance

FAIRFIELD - The Jefferson County Fairgrounds was filled with the sound of swords clanking and banjos strumming this past weekend for the third installment of the Fairfield Renaissance Faire.

Organizer Katrina Vincent said she was thrilled with the turnout, which was triple last year's. She said 950 attended the faire on Saturday and 675 attended it on Sunday for a total of 1,625.

'People loved that we tripled the entertainment with the music, the battles and the camels,' she said. "They really liked that we had a variety of food and drink, with seven total food and drink vendors. But mostly people just enjoyed the atmosphere."

Washington's **Latino Fest** canceled for 2025

WASHINGTON — Organizers say they won't hold Washington's Latino Festival this summer, canceling plans for a popular day-long annual tradition in the city's central park marked by an abundance of authentic food, flashy lucha libre matches, plus musical mariachi and "Banda" performances.

A press release about the cancellation cited non-specific "current circumstances." But in an interview late last week, Latinos for Washington President and Cofounder Sonia Leyva said the decision was driven by safety concerns, citing a nationwide arrests and deportations by federal immigration officials since President Donald Trump took office.

"We need to take care of our community members, and it's almost like we don't want to do anything that brings so much attention, and brings people there for the wrong reasons," she said, adding that she was disappointed because, "it's a family-oriented event, we've had it every summer for the last 10 years, people look forward to it ... it's supposed to be something happy, and it's turned into something that's just scary. We don't want to put anyone in danger.'

While the national monthly rate of arrests in January was considerably lower than in the final year of the Biden administration according to Reuters and NBC, the current president has moved to make the process faster for immigrants without criminal records.

The Trump administration says it has arrested and deported tens of thousands of people since he took office in January, adding that roughly half of those deported had criminal records. But attorneys for many of the displaced say the process happened without sufficient legal notice, and sometimes skipped court hearings, ignored judges' orders or displaced legal U.S. residents, according to coverage in national outlets including Reuters, PBS, and Fox News.

MT. PLEASANT — Two longtime leaders of the Mt. Pleasant Evening Rotary Club were honored with prestigious awards for their decades of global and local service during a recent Rotary district conference.

Cal Litwiller received Rotary International Foundation's Distinguished Service Award, the highest recognition given to Rotarians worldwide. Rachel Litwiller was presented with the Guardian of Integrity Award, a district honor recognizing ethical leadership and outstanding

Cal Litwiller sat in the audience at the conference listening to a description of the Distinguished Service Award recipient's accomplishments and tried to guess who it could possibly be. As the details unfolded — mentioning trips to Malawi and the development of new grant methods — his wife, Rachel, nudged him, realizing the honoree was none other than her husband.

'It was a huge surprise," Cal recounted. "I sat there and they were reading that description, and I looked at my wife, and I said, 'Who are they talking about?' I was trying to think who it could possibly be. Then they started talking about specifics, and my wife looked at me and said she knew it had to be me. I just sat there and [was] just in total shock. I had no idea.'

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
