Decoration day was very appropriately observed in Stratford Monday afternoon, the exercises being held at the M.E. church. The church was filled to overflowing and flowers, flags and bunting furnished the decorations.

Tuesday afternoon of last week Albert Anderson's little daughter Ansel climbed up on the wire fence to look at the chickens and her floot slipped off the wire, causing her to fall in such a manner that a barb of the wire caught her left forefinger close to the palm and tore the flesh from the bone almost to the end of her fin-

The excessive and continued rainfall the past two weeks has been the means of flooding the majority of the basements with water at depths varying from two inches to eighteen inches. Large ponds, which have been dry for years, are overflowing and are now small lakes.
