### **Currents of Change**

On July 22 Dr. Allen Shriver, Director of Wellness and Nutrition Policy at the Harkin Institute, hosted a webinar titled "Toxic Ties: What's in our Water?" As part of the 2025 Watershed Talks, the focus of his presentation was the status of lowa's water quality. He highlighted the upcoming public release of a water quality report from a study commissioned by Polk County Board of Supervisors: "one of the most comprehensive water quality studies ever conducted of the Des Moines and Raccoon Rivers, titled Currents of Change."

On Monday, August 4, 6:00 – 7:30 pm, the public is invited to the first official presentation of findings from the study (harkininstitute.drake.edu/events-calendar). During the webinar Dr. Shriver also shared the genesis of the Harkin Institute's increasing focus on industrial agriculture's impact upon public health and the environment.

As background he noted that after some early nonstarters and negotiations, the newly established Institute chose to seek a home with Drake University rather than continue the initial effort to be housed by Iowa State. By choosing a private university rather than a regents institution, the Harkin Institute would have more freedom from political pressure exerted by powerful special interest groups' constraints, all seeking to gloss over or omit uncomfortable results from going public. Such constraint would compromise a core value: "The Harkin Institute was founded on the premise that good public policy is best achieved when policymakers have access to high quality information, political processes are open and well-understood and citizens are informed and active participants."

Aware and alarmed by lowa's number two position with the highest cancer rate in the nation, the Harkin Institute, in collaboration with a number of agencies and entities, is conducting a scientific review about any correlations between cancer incidences and three ag practices: pesticide use, water-borne nitrate levels, and PFAS contamination. Complementing the scientific review is the public outreach currently underway. The Institute is doing listening sessions in 15 different sites across the state to collect stories of lived cancer experience. An early outcome is that the public hungers for a venue where their stories can be heard.

After the recent release of Currents of Change to the Polk County Board of Supervisors, an unsurprising result was pushback by entities who wanted the results to be muted or just not publicly presented. Noting pressure to water down the information, the Harkin Institute volunteered to host an official public release at Drake University next week. Dr. Shriver noted that current registrations for the free event indicate the same hunger as the listening sessions mentioned above. He also indicated that a large turnout on the 4th would send a strong message to decision makers about how interested and concerned the public is about our water quality.
