Swea City City Council Meeting for

Council met in regular session on Wednesday November 19th, 2025, at Swea City, City Hall at 6:30 p.m. with Mayor Zielske presiding. Employees Travis Stevens, Tylor Evans and Alycia Wolterman were present. Present were Geerdes, Perdue. Hoye absent. Also present were library board member Dave Rock, Sherriff Roger Fisher and Michael Tidemann with the paper. Visitors were Zoey Laubenthal, Cheyenne Otis, Barry Boland, Cal Wolterman, Deb Johnson, Andy Donnelly, Troy Langford, Phil Albers, Gary Anderson, Chris Stevens, Marvin Petersen, Victor Carranza, Monica Johnson, Sharon Work, Kadin Walter, Evan, and Cole McFarland. Motion by CM Perdue, second by CM Sobolik to approve the consent agenda. All ayes,

1. Motion to approve agenda. 2. Motion to approve bills.

3. Motion to approve minutes of previous meetings.

4. Motion to approve financial

reports.
5. Motion to approve liquor license

for Lucky Wife pending payment and paperwork.

Johnson voiced concerns about the stucco house near the school that is falling down noting she's concerned for kids in the area. CM Perdue stated he went to the residence of the owner and didn't get an answer. CM Perdue said he would post a notice. Mayor Zielske reminded him there is a process to be followed. Gary Anderson questioned cold storage building costs and stated that franchise fees are taxpayer dollars. Chris Stevens inquired about a public records request and complaint he had issued. Mayor Zielske noted it is with the attorney. Gary Anderson inquired about why money was being spent on something like this. Mayor Zielske reminded Anderson multiple times that it is not an open discussion forum. CM Geerdes asked how much is being spent on attorneys for Chris's complaint. Alycia asked CM Geerdes if he wanted the legal answer or does he

want to handle issues without the legal

answer, stating she isn't an attorney.

CM Geerdes noted he wasn't either.

Mayor Zielske reminded Council that there is a policy in place which Council requests should cost and that is what the City is standing behind. Mayor Zielske invited Council to read the resolutions that Council had put into place. CM Geerdes stated he feels the City spends too much on the attorney but he knows they are necessary. Alycia noted that not all situations are simple and she needs a black and white answer, so she followed the policy. Mayor Zielske stated that if a Council makes decisions and the next Council doesn't follow it what's the point. CM Kollasch noted when she worked at the school there was a similar policy in place. Alycia explained that in this situation she followed the policy then Chris filed a complaint with IPIB. Because she hadn't delt with IPIB in that manner she reached out to the attorney as she doesn't have that

expertise. Dave Rock reported that the board recently discussed future goals, a local survey was released for individuals to complete, and they will be hiring a library sub.

Fireman Chris Stevens stated there was nothing to report.

Water and Sewer: Travis reported a new service line was put in and annual lead survey notices have been sent out. He also shared drawdown is finished and the lagoon is coming along well. CM Perdue said he's received some complaints about water. Mayor Zielske inquired what specifically noting 10 years of water testing and that the city water meets DNR requirements. Travis noted the City water is well within any range for anything. CM Geerdes asked what has changed in the last

5 years. Travis responded "nothing". Travis reviewed the treatment process and explained the water is softened. Travis reminded attendees that it is ground water and we can't control what comes out of the ground. He also stated it would cost significantly more for additional treatment but nearly everything in the water treatment plant has been replaced except for the softener. Mayor Zielske suggested the Council tour City buildings. Garbage: Tylor reported operations

are running smoothly. He noted 3 more rural dumpsters have been added and more may need to be purchased. Tylor then stated he had a few things he would like to say. He noted that for the last few months his personal name has been brought up on Facebook by Gary Anderson, Marvin Peterson and the neighborly Facebook page. He shared that he comes to work and gives the best of his ability to his work and his name was spouted several times. He also shared that in his off time he mentors a young family friend and is involved with his church. He also noted he coaches and attends youth sports activities. He said some people do not realize that throughout all of this he has been struggling with serious medical issues of his niece. And amidst all of that when he should be focusing on family, he has received comments from friends and family about social media posts that are 100% complete false lies about him. Tylor noted he has remained very professional with Gary & Yesway. Tylor stated, you hate me because you hate Wendy. The lies are coming from hate to tear down Swea City, he said. In closing Tylor stated -I will pray for you all and will pray for your peace-truth always prevails. Some of the visitors began commenting. Mayor Zielske stated this is not an open discussion forum. Marvin Peterson stated he didn't slander Tylor and all he said was he thanked them for the work they did. Mayor Zielske stated there is a human behind whoever you are typing about on Facebook. Gary Anderson spoke up, and Zoey Laubenthal noted Mayor Zielske had said not to speak up. Gary Anderson spoke against Zoey and

Council reviewed estimates for replacing City Hall roof at length. They discussed the differences and CM Sobolik noted it is currently steel panel. CM Perdue noted that it needs to be done and he would like to do snap lock. CM Geerdes noted he thinks steel

Victor Carranza aggravatedly stated,

stop, just stop, all I saw on that page

was bickering let's get back to the

panel for a \$9,000 difference but snap lock has less chance to leak. CM Sobolik noted he'd like to go with steel panel. CM Geerdes noted steel panel is on the new cold storage and he thinks all of the cold storage was the right thing to do. CM Perdue made a motion for snap lock not to exceed \$25,000 second by CM Kollasch discussion about spending continued. CM Kollasch noted she was considering longevity. CM Geerdes stated for \$9,000 less Council should just go with the steel panel. Mayor Zielske noted there was 1st and 2nd on the table for snap lock not to exceed \$25,000. Perdue aye. Kollasch, Geerdes, Sobolik Nay. Motion failed. Motion by CM Sobolik second by CM Geerdes, to go with the steel panel through Jaeger Associates not to exceed \$18000. All ayes. Carried. Mayor Zielske noted they needed to vote on the gutters. Travis Stevens stated the gutters don't need to be replaced. Motion by CM Geerdes not to replace the gutters second by CM Perdue. All ayes. Carried. No report from ISG Mayor Zielske reviewed pay

request #3 from King Construction for \$603060.00. Motion by CM Kollasch second by CM Sobolik to approve pay request #3 and issue payment pending paperwork and receipt of funds. All ayes. Carried.

Kossuth County EMS Director Phil Albers provided a report for County EMS noting they are finalizing FY25 and will be reviewing the budget. He also stated they are hoping to hire more medics and he spoke about vehicle replacements. Phil also discussed facilities at both hub locations. Mayor Zielske asked if they planned on building a new building and Phil stated there are some housekeeping things that need to be addressed. Phil Albers explained to Council he

was in his old house until Sept 3rd and only used 4 gallons of water and he doesn't feel he should have to pay for the full months bill. Alycia noted she verified with the software company that the current system doesn't prorate, and accounts have always been handled this way. She also explained she doesn't have the authority to change the way it's handled. CM Sobolik asked Albers if he'd asked the buyer to pay part of it. Albers noted he did not want to do that and it was his choice. CM Kollasch stated we understand where you are coming from, but we don't have the ability to change it at this point in time. Alycia inquired why he had not had the water shut off previously, Albers stated it was his choice as he was paying the bill. The discussion continued at length. Motion by CM Kollasch to follow procedures the City has been following for utility bill as has been done in the past, second by CM Sobolik. Sobolik, Kollasch Geerdes Ayes. CM Perdue stated he would like to abstain because its family. Carried

Council reviewed the SFR. Mayor Zielske reminded Council it is a financial report of street expenditures ending FY25. Alvcia reviewed additional details. Motion Kollasch to approve the FY25 SFR second by CM Geerdes. All ayes Mayor Zielske reported to Council

the total revenues for the FY25 AFR were \$1,501,630 and total expenditures were \$1,486,388 and noted there was money left even with all the spending. Alycia Wolterman reviewed AFR details at length with Council.

Motion by CM Sobolik second by CM Geerdes to approve purchase of \$25.00 Swea Bucks for Winter Wonderland. All ayes. Carried.

Council discussed 302 & 304 3rd St N. Mayor Zielske shared with Council the interested party is a group of investors. She reviewed the process would be to request the County assign the certs and agree to abate the back taxes, then the City may acquire the deed. The City would then sell to the group of investors. Motion by CM Sobolik second by CM Geerdes to move

forward as described. All ayes carried. Motion by CM Geerdes to set the public hearing for 2025 Codification for 12/17/25 at 6:35 second by CM Perdue. All ayes carried.

CM Perdue noted he spoke to the owner of the partially burned residence, and they said they would try to get it enclosed. CM Sobolik said CM Perdue would need to follow through with the process and a fence should be put up. CM Kollasch noted there is a specific process. Alycia noted the City would need to review with the attorney to determine if the City can secure the property.

Mayor Zielske directed her attention to the visitors and stated none of what she had to say was against Troy Langford but instead stated specifically to Gary Anderson and Monica Johnson I don't think I voted on anything, Councils made the decisions". Johnson replied that she hadn't said Wendy did vote. Mayor Zielske then reminded attendees that it is the Mayors' job to keep Council informed. Council voted to move forward once the City was served with court proceedings. She also noted Gary was given the opportunity to agree to a plea and instead he quite vehemently stated in person that it was going to court. Mayor Zielske further explained that in regard to the Johnson tile case, the City had issued municipal infractions which are part of the nuisance process which simply means you are in violation. Council decides if you go to court. Johnson stated she spoke with two Council members who didn't know about the case. Mayor Zielske noted Council was notified and the minutes show Council was informed. She also noted the council members included in the suit were Kollasch, Wolterman, Perdue, Hoye and Boland. Mayor Zielske then informed Council the City had received notification that the trust had filed to dismiss action without prejudice.

CM Geerdes inquired if the light on the East end of the shelter house could be replaced. Mayor Zielske said it could

O&A: Rural Health Matters With U.S. Senator Chuck Grassley Q: What is the Rural Health Transformation program? A: Congress beefed up federal dollars to expand access to health

care services in rural communities in the health and tax law signed in July by President Trump. The Rural Health Transformation program was designed to improve access to care, improve health outcomes, prioritize new and emergency technologies, strengthen local and regional partnerships, enhance economic opportunity, prioritize data and technology driven solutions and outline strategies to manage longterm financial solvency and operating models of rural hospitals. I led efforts in the U.S. Senate to support this initiative and add \$50 billion in new federal spending to boost resources for Americans in underserved areas by keeping critical health care services available close to home. The Rural Health Transformation

program will make \$10 billion available annually for five years. The law specifies 50% of the \$10 billion must be distributed equally among states, so every state will get a minimum of \$100 million annually for the five years. The other 50% will be distributed based on state applications reviewed by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

This month, I joined Iowa's federal delegation to support Iowa's application – called "Healthy Hometowns" – that seeks \$1 billion in funding from the Rural Health Transformation program over the next five years. CMS, the federal agency administering the program, is expected to announce awards by Dec. services, such as health and wellness

Iowa's proposal outlines six specific initiatives to enhance the health care infrastructure and improve health care outcomes, including investments in telehealth, medical equipment and care for uninsured Iowans; recruiting and retaining top-tier health care professionals; increasing access to cancer screening and treatment; coordinating multidisciplinary care teams to stretch resources and support community care professionals; providing seamless access to health records across the state to support continuity of care; and bringing emergency care to rural residents with mobile health and high-risk transport

Q: What other initiatives are you leading to address disparities in rural health care?

A: This month, I completed my

annual 99 county meetings for the 45th year in a row. Health care ranks among the top issues that come up at my meetings, no matter if I'm touring a factory, visiting a school or holding an open town meeting. I also regularly meet with Iowans who come to Washington to discuss health care to inform my work at the policymaking table. Throughout my years serving Iowans in the Senate, I've cut my teeth on health care policy as the former chairman and current member of the Senate Finance Committee, which has oversight and legislative jurisdiction over federal health care programs, including Medicare and Medicaid. As you would expect, I've leveraged my seniority to go to the mat for Iowans, from allowing local pharmacists to get reimbursed for health care

screenings, immunizations and diabetes management, to improving maternal and child health services.

I also spearheaded adoption of the voluntary Rural Emergency Hospital (REH) program to help rural communities who face workforce shortages and financial hardship keep their hometown hospital doors open Signed into law five years ago, the program gives rural hospitals the flexibility to keep their doors open by focusing on 24/7 emergency care and outpatient services. For several years, I've led the charge to ensure this program is working as intended to preserve access to essential health care in rural areas. So far, 42 rural hospitals in 17 states have transitioned to this model and I'm working to get feedback from participating hospitals to better understand their challenges to help smooth the process for other rural hospitals across the country.

Earlier this year, I welcomed action by CMS to fill 10 available spaces in its Rural Community Hospital Demonstration program. Last year I pushed the Biden administration to fill these openings and will keep up the pressure to ensure Iowa continues to get physician residency slots to support our medical workforce in communities across the state.

From pushing for affordable hearing aids through the bipartisan Over-the-Counter Hearing Aids Act to expanding Medicare coverage for telehealth services that make it easier for patients to connect with their doctors, I'll continue listening to Iowans and leading the way in Washington to keep access to quality health care close to home as a steadfast advocate for Rural America.
