ORDINANCE NO. #6-2025 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF THOMPSON, IOWA BY AMENDING SECTIONS 50.02 TO ADD A RUISANCE REGARDING EXCESSIVE STORAGE OF DIRT AND RUBBLE AND CEMENT OR CONCRETE CRUSHING
BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Thompson, lowa:

SECTION 1. SECTION MODIFIED. Section 50.02 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Thompson, lowa, is amended to add the following subsection:

50.02 NUISANCES ENUMERATED. The following or parts of ordinances in conflict with the conditions that are deemed to be nuisances in the City:

13. Excessive Storage of Dirt and Rubble: Concrete and Cement Crushing. The storage of

excessive dirt, rubble, and crushed cement or concrete. The crushing of cement or concrete.

SECTION 2. REPEALER All ordinances or parts of ordinances

in conflict with the

provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any section provision, or part of shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision, or part thereof not adjudged

unconstitutional SECTION 4. WHEN EFFECTIVE. This ordinance shall be in effect from and after its final
