HAMPTON CITY COUNCIL REGULAR SESSION MINUTES THURSDAY, MAY 22, 2025, at 6:00 P.M.

The Hampton City Council Regular Session Meeting was called to order at the Hampton City Council Chambers by Mayor Steve Birdsall at 6:00 p.m. Council members in attendance were James Davies, Bill Hodge, Bill Holmstrom, Jerre Grefe and Patrick Palmer. Barry Lamos was absent. Also present were City Manager Ron Dunt, Police Chief Mark Morrison, and Public Works Director Doug Tarr. Mayor Birdsall invited those present to join in the Pledge of Allegiance to the U.S. flag. Mayor Birdsall called for a motion to approve the agenda.
