Supervisors discuss defunct pipeline in Humboldt County

An abandoned anhydrous pipeline that runs through Humboldt County became the unexpected conversation at Monday's Humboldt County Supervisors meeting on March 31.

Humboldt County Emergency Management Coordinator Kyle Bissell asked the Supervisors if they had spoken to ONEOK.

ONEOK had contacted Bissell to inquire regarding emergency responders along the defunct pipeline who might be available to assist in an emergency.

However, ONEOK had not conveyed its intended use of the pipeline. Bissell reminded the group in attendance that the pipeline had not been used for several years at least.

HCMH welcomes **Senator Grassley**

Senator Grassley tours Humboldt County Memorial Hospital to discuss rural hospitals

Humboldt County Memorial Hospital (HCMH) CEO Michelle Sleiter spoke about Sen-ator Grassley's visit to the hospital during their recent board

meeting on Tuesday, March 25. Sleiter told the board that due to protests at his previous stop in Franklin County at a public meeting at the court-

house there, it was decided to change his appearance at the hospital slightly. His visit to the hospital in

Humboldt however, had been an invite-only visit.

"I got a call from their whole secret service team on the way here saying they were concerned as they were talking about bringing everyone (the protestors) to Humboldt," Sleiter said.

Because of the threat of the protests, they rerouted the Senator to Independent Living so that it would be easier to get

in and out. "As you know, he is under full police detail so the Secret Service was very heightened.

We did end up having four or five protestors that did maintain their respective space and stayed off the property," Sleiter said.

She is looking to update their policy on protesting and have something in place in the next several months.

Hospice

Rural Liaison James Roetman reported that the Paula J. Baber Hospice House in Fort Dodge had closed due to financial losses.

"They received a lot of negative attention for closing that. The good news is they have identified three or four other options for families in the Fort

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Angela Weslink, parent coordinator with the Connections Program with Building Families, attended the meeting to request that the Supervisors proclaim April, National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

The proclamation states "The Humboldt County Board of Supervisors do hereby proclaim April as National Child Abuse Prevention Month. Organizers urge all citizens to recognize this month by building a narrative of hope for children and families through collaboration and the creation of an ecosystem of primary prevention that does not currently exist in this country."

The Supervisors had a few questions regarding the five-

year plan. "We classify some of the structures as a bridge but some are structures that go under a gravel road that if they go under a gravel road we could move that up, right?" Supervi-

"The good thing is there aren't too many places in the county that there is only one way out if a bridge failed," Supervisor Chairman Rick Pedersen said.

"Humboldt County is blessed with a road almost every mile. Out-of-distance travel would be minimized if we endcourthouse turn the outside ed up losing a structure," Loots said.
