Humboldt County audit completed

Tim McCartan with TP Anderson & Company, P.C. walked through the audit report for the last fiscal year end- Auditor's Office. ing on June, 2024.

McCartan stated that cur- Drainage District 11 rently, the net position of the county's funds increased from the Supervisors meeting to dis-33,374,336 to \$35,893,772.

The statement of Fiduciary Net Position Custodial Funds shows that the county took in \$7,197,320 in property taxes with another \$8,750,603 in state tax credits, 911 surchage fees, drivers license fees, office fees and collections, auto license, use tax and postage, assessments, trusts and miscellaneous fees and grants for a total of \$15,947,923.

Expenditures totaled \$13,428,487 which included \$4,691,021 for roads and transportation, \$2,967,443 for public safety and legal services and \$1,629,401 for administration
