### The View From Here

May 2 is our scheduled last day of session. We will be headed into overtime this week as we pass some final bills and settle on budgets.

The Senate debated on Monday and Tuesday this week to either send bills already passed by the House to the Governor for her signature or send bills to the House for their consideration.

One of the bills we passed this week was House File 835, which would help students who face the risk of seizures in school. This bill will require at least one employee at each school be trained to administer or assist self-administration of rescue medication should a seizure occur during school.

We also passed Senate File 639, establishing a business court for the purpose of resolving complex commercial and business litigation. Many states al-

ready have such courts and adding one in Iowa, along with many other pro-business policies, will help us attract more businesses to

A bill I mentioned in previous newsletters deals with pharmacy benefit manager reform. PBMs establish how much a pharmacy gets paid for the drugs they dispense under insurance. Senate File 383 implements protections for Iowa patients, cost savings measures, and reforms to help rural pharmacies. This is similar to measures passed in many other states and supports transparency of reimbursements and actual costs of drugs. SF 383 was sent to the House for their consideration.

The controversy over eminent domain's use continues with 12 senators pledging not to vote for budget bills until HF 639 is given a chance on the Senate floor.

This gathering is something we try to do every year and it blesses me to get together as legislators with no agendas for a night of fun.

#### May 13, 1915

Stanhope Record: Several new houses are in process of building in Stanhope, several changes and improvements have been made on residences and are in contemplation. There seems to be a general spirit of improvement and general hustle over town. Yet we need several residences to rent. Families would locate in Stanhope if they could find suitable buildings in which to move their fami-

#### May 14, 1925

F. H. Ferbitz announces a demonstration month to Model 52 washer. A special representative from the One Minute factory at Newton, Iowa will be here to show and explain the many advanced features embodied in this new One Minute.

The Brinton estate 160 acre farm just west of Ellsworth on the north side of the road was sold at referee's auction sale last Saturday to close the estate. Some of the heirs, "Sam" Brinton and his sisters bought the farm.

Mrs. Jennie Borcherding will again soon open up a photograph studio in Jewell, occupying the old photograph studio building that is not located on the rear half of the lot occupied by the Manhattan oil station. Just as soon as the building and premises can be put in good repair, she will occupy the building and open up for business.

A rumor was current all day Monday to the effect that Mr. and Mrs. Russell Nielsen have sold their R. & E. cafe. Inquiry revealed that the rumor was entirely unfounded; they have not sold and have no intention of doing so.
