Mason Gaetzke achieves Eagle Scout rank—Honoring the departed through church kiosk project

Mason Gaetzke, a local young man and member of Boy Scout Troop 143, has officially earned the rank of Eagle Scoutthe highest honor in Scouting, achieved by only a small percentage of Scouts nationwide. In order to earn this achievement, Gaetzke completed a service project that now stands at the heart of the Elk Creek Church Cemetery: a permanent, weatherresistant kiosk that includes a detailed cemetery map and a full registry of the departed buried there.

Machine, which is based out of Joice, and Sign Pro, which is based out of Ames." Gaetzke worked alongside his Uncle Ross to pour the concrete base. He collaborated with Bodenham Machine to construct the kiosk frame, and contracted Sign Pro of Ames to design and produce the plot map and registry signage. The result is a permanent installation that serves both practical and commemorative purposes—adding a feature that is both informative and honorary.

Gaetzke said one of the most valuable lessons he learned throughout the process

The kiosk, mounted on a circular concrete pad, allows visitors to easily locate burial plots by name and number.

"My project benefitted the friends and families who have loved ones buried in the Elk Creek Church cemetery, because it made it more convenient for them to be able to look at the registry of names and find the plot number they were looking for, instead of going up and down the rows looking for a specific grave," Gaetzke explained.

The project was inspired by a conversation with Pastor Linda Johnson-Prestholt, who mentioned that the Elk Creek Cemetery Board had long discussed the idea of adding a plot directory. As a member of the church himself, Gaetzke saw a meaningful opportunity and, to bring the idea to life, Gaetzke presented a proposal to the cemetery board, outlining the purpose, benefits, funding plan, and construction timeline. After securing their approval, he successfully applied for a \$9,500 grant from the Worth County Development Authority (WCDA) to cover materials and fabrication.

In fact, the project required coordination with several businesses and organiza-

was the importance of patience.

"The process from start to finish took almost a year," he said. "Completing an Eagle Scout project is a slow and steady race, but the outcome is worth it."

Beyond the project, earning the Eagle rank required Gaetzke to complete seven ranks and numerous merit badges in areas such as first aid, citizenship, and personal management. He also underwent several board reviews to demonstrate his knowledge and growth.

Mason's official Eagle Scout Ceremony was held May 11, 2025, appropriately at Elk Creek Church, surrounded by family, friends, fellow Scouts, and supporters who helped along the way.

"After my ceremony, I felt accomplished . . . relieved from all of the hard work . . . and optimistic and excited for the next chapter of my life." Gaetzke credits his parents, Scout lead-

ers, and peers for helping him stay moti-

vated, especially during the more difficult parts of the journey. To younger Scouts, he offers this advice: "Stay positive and patient. You may get stuck, but if you keep going and believe in the process, you'll get there. The
