

# Lake Mills Public Library Reader of the Month

The Lake Mills Graphic, The Globe Gazette, The Albert Lea Tribune, The Des Moines Register . . . you name it, this month's "Reader of the Month" reads it. I'm honored to introduce you to, not only our June Reader of the Month, but also my mother-in-law, Shirley Brackev.

I've tried to highlight various offerings through the Lake Mills Public Library in my previous articles: Large Print books, the Libby app for electronic users, books on CD, children's materials, and much more. Newspaper and magazine offerings are other popular items here at the Lake Mills Public Library as well. If you walk through the doors at any given moment, chances are you will probably find someone sitting at the back table with a newspaper in front of them. Shirley is one of those people.

Not only does Shirley enjoy reading the newspapers, but she is also an avid fiction reader. She especially enjoys reading the works of Dorothy Garlock, an author who was born in Texas, lived in Oklahoma, and moved to Clear Lake, Iowa in 1955. Garlock has over 20 million books in print in over 36 countries and 18 different languages. Shirley enjoys Garlock's romance novels and books in the historical fiction genre. Nora Roberts and Dean Koontz are other favorite authors of Shirley's.

Shirley and a couple of her friends enjoy sharing books purchased from our Book Sale in September/October. If you've never been to the Book Sale, it's worth a visit. We "weed" books during the month of August that haven't been read in four to five years, delete them

from our system, and prepare them for sale during September and October. As the weeks progress, the prices drop. By the end of the sale, you can buy whatever fits in a bag for a donation. I suggest you follow Shirley's lead and stop in during the book sale to see if there are any good books you can share with your friends, too.

I know it's not polite to address a person's age, but I'm telling you, this woman really is a marvel. Let me just politely say, Shirley is closer to a centenarian than she is to a Gen Alpha. (How's that for diplomatic?) She's up before the sun, has walked a minimum of two miles before the 6 a.m. news, washes her own windows (in a split-level house) and could probably beat all of her great-grandkids in a race around the track. Like I said, a marvel. Even though she may not be a person who might benefit from a new initiative we are considering at the library, I ran it by her for some input anyway.

The Lake Mills Public Library proposed offering a delivery service the second and fourth Thursdays of every month to better serve those in our community who may find it challenging to get to the library. According to iowadatacenter.org, Lake Mills currently has 490 people over the age of 65. Of those, 235 are 80 years of age or older. That is nearly 1/4 of our population. While many of these patrons still frequent the library on their own, one can only assume that some are unable to.

Our mission statement reads as follows: The Lake Mills Public Library is dedicated to excellence in service. All city and rural citizens will have free and equal access to recreational materials, patron programming for all ages, information and up-to-date technology in a

### wide variety of formats.

Two things pop out to me while reading this statement: 1) "excellence in service" and 2) "free and equal access." Offering home delivery two times each month addresses both points. Why not do all we can to provide materials for people in our community as a way of providing excellent service?

I asked Shirley her thoughts regarding this idea. She was more than supportive. Reading is an important part of her life, and she feels that the more we can help older adults get books in their hands the better off they will be. As I said, Shirley may not need home delivery of books yet, but if it would help others access reading materials, she is all for it.

The City Council asked that we conduct a survey to gauge the need and/or interest level of this initiative. Please watch Facebook for a simple, short survey to help gather data, as well as a paper/pencil copy available in the library as well. We know, however, that the population we are looking to serve may not use Facebook nor may they be able to come into the library to complete a paper/pencil survey either. We would welcome any phone calls (641-592-0092) regarding need/interest in home delivery for either yourself or someone important in your life. We will then decide whether to pursue this service or not based upon the response received.

Whether it is a great novel, an interesting nonfiction, a sweet picture book with a grand (or even great-grand) child, or every newspaper on the shelf . . . Read. Read. Read. Just ask Shirley-reading keeps you young
