CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

JUNE 9, 2025

Mayor Greer called the meeting to order at 5:30 PM, June 9, 2025, at the City Hall Council Chambers, 10 W State Street, and led the pledge of allegiance. Roll call-Present: Melissa Fonseca, Barry Kell, Mike Ladehoff, Mark Mitchell, Greg Nichols, Jeff Schneider, Gary Thompson. Public comments for items not on the agenda were provided. Mayor, Council, and Administrator comments were provided.

CONSENT AGENDA

B; Goldenland Asian Food Grocery Store at 11 E State St; Vaughns Pub at 22 N 1st Ave; May 2025 Building and Trade Permit Report; Reappoint Steven Hay, Heidi Hogan, and Wayne Waltermire to the Fire Code Board of Appeals, term 8/1/25-8/1/29; Resolution Adopting a Lease Agreement Policy for the City of Marshalltown; Resolution Approving Contract Change Order #4 for the Linn Creek Trail-head and Bridge Project, #TRL24001 and #TRL24002, an increase of \$279,150.55; Resolution Approving Contract Change Order #7 for the Riverview Park Phase 1 Project, #PRK23001, an Increase of \$6,497.50; Resolution Setting Public Hearings for the Conveyance and Transfer of Title for 501 North 1st Avenue, 915 South Center Street, and 919 South Center Street; Resolution Authorizing Memorandum of Understanding between Union Pacific Railroad and the City of Marshalltown for Purpose of Financial Incentive and Intent to Close At-Grade 2nd Street Railroad Crossing. Motion carried 7-0.

Motion by Jeff Schneider, second by Barry Kell, to approve Resolution Adopting Personnel Policy Amendments and the Creation of Policy 3.17 Voluntary Furlough. Motion by Gary Thompson, second by Mark Mitchell, to amend by removing the requirement from Policy 3.9 Bereavement, to attend a funeral, and striking "may" from Policy 4.1 Non-Union Compensation/Classification pertaining to employees who meet or exceed expectations getting a step increase. Motion carried 7-0. Motion by Gary Thompson, second by Greg Nichols, to approve Resolution Adopting Personnel Policy Amendments and the Creation of Policy 3.17 Voluntary Furlough as amended. Motion carried 7-0.

Motion by Jeff Schneider, second by Greg Nichols to approve Resolution Authorizing the Purchase of a 60-Inch Zero-Turn Mower for the Price of \$6,493.58 from Mow Pow'r of Newton for use in the Street Division and Declaring Asset 5883, a 2002 New Holland MC 28 Mower, Surplus for Disposal Thereof. Amended motion by Jeff Schneider, second by Mark Mitchell to amend the purchasing policy to allow for a local preference for 1% up to \$10,000. The motion was withdrawn. Amended motion by Mike Ladehoff, second by Mark Mitchell to accept 2nd bid from local vendor Central Iowa Farm Store and have staff bring back the 3% local preference amendment. Motion carried 7-0.

REPORTS

David Hicks, Director of YSS Marshall County, provided the MPACT Quarterly Update. From January through May, advocates responded to 82 calls for service, involving 164 people, with 30% of them being under 18 years of age. Of the calls, 30% were for homelessness, 20% for mental health, and 20% for family conflict. 82% of the responding officers on the initial call went back into service. 98% of the callers who requested services followed through with program recommendations. Program donors were able to provide 19 nights of hotel stays for 14 people and 1 dog. There were 230 follow-up contacts, involving 350 people. David shared a FLOCK camera success story, locating a gentleman with dementia who was lost, and the advocate was able to assist the family. Staff members attended the National Co-Responder Conference and were able to present on the program.

Chief Jones presented the 2024 Marshalltown Police Department Annual Report, noting FLOCK cameras have been very successful. There is a focus on officer wellness, recruitment, and building community relations. Calls for service have been consistent with staff training on how to handle calls quickly. Officers handled 851 welfare checks in the community, which Chief Jones believes is an important service.
