

Students and parents from the Kingsley-Pierson community recently traveled to Washington, D.C., for a fun learning experience. The trip took place from April 15th -18th, and the students saw some of the nation's greatest monuments and buildings over those days. In total, 34 K-P students and 19 adults traveled to D.C. under the direction of Laura Boustead and Val Sitzmann.

For the past two years, the middle school students have been fundraising to make this

Before the trip, students spent time in their Middle School Social Studies class with Mrs. Boustead learning about the Washington D.C. monuments, museums, and famous sites. This learning included some of our wellknown Founding Fathers and their role in establishing the also learned about the setup of the national government and how it affects them and their families.

The first day of the trip included a chartered bus ride to Omaha's Eppley Airfield with an early morning flight out. For some students, this was their first time flying. After arriving in DC, the students had the opportunity to stretch their legs with a tour through Arlington National Cemetery. Students saw many famous memorials, but the highlight of that tour was watching the changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. To round out

that day, the students stopped at the Iwo Jima Memorial, the 9/11 Memorial at the Pentagon, and the Jefferson Memorial.

The second day of the trip kicked off with a morning tour of the beautiful National Cathedral. After lunch, the students enjoyed a quick stop at the Smithsonian National Zoo, where they had a chance to see the two giant panda bears from China playing outside. From there, the trip continued with a White House picture stop, the Smithsonian Museum of American History, Ford's Theater, the Peterson House, FDR Memorial, and MLK Memorial

The third day included a tour of the Capitol building. Students had the chance to see the Rotunda and Statuary Hall, in which they found the Iowa statue of Norman E. Borlaug. Next, students spent time in the Library of Congress, and a picture stop was made at the Supreme Court building. The rest of the day included the Einstein statue, the World War II monument, the Holocaust Museum, the Vietnam Wall, the Women's Vietnam statue, the Lincoln Memorial, and the Korean Memorial.

The final day of the trip started with a bus ride out to George Washington's Mount

Vernon. Students were able to tour his mansion, see his and Martha Washington's tomb, the Potomac River, and learn about his 16 sided barn. Before heading to the airport for an evening flight, the group rounded out the trip with a stop at the Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History.

The group averaged 7-9 miles per day, with each day starting around 7 AM and arriving back at the hotel around 8 PM. The group went through the World Strides organization to help with the planning of the trip. A K-P to DC 2027 trip is already in the works!
