Citizen Spotlight: Yockey taught 38 years at Woodbury Central

Moville is fortunate to have a man like Mr. Yockey in its midst. He devoted his life to shaping young students into responsible adults.

John Yockey taught business classes at Woodbury Central for thirty-eight years. The first superintendent he worked under was Mr. Willard D. Topp during the 1962-63 school year.

His teaching style was marked by patience and a strong speaking voice.

Mr. Yockey was one of four sons raised on a farm near Moville. His father taught him

the value of saving money by opening a savings account for him at the First Trust and Savings Bank in Moville when he was in 7th grade.

Mr. Yockey's education started at a country school. He remembers walking approximately fifteen minutes through John Ashley's farm field to reach the school building. He attended public school in Anthon from grades 6-12. He attended Wayne State Teacher's College in Nebraska and graduated in 1960. His college tuition at Wayne State was approximately \$4,000. Most of that debt was paid by the sale

of a pig from the Yockey farm. He received his master's degree in business in 1980 from Truman University in Kirksville, Missouri.

He was the only business teacher at Woodbury Central for the first eight years of employment. He taught one hundred students each year. Each class had approximately thirty students. Mr. Yockey's teaching career saw great changes in the field of business. He taught shorthand, dictation, typing, business law, keyboarding, computer skills and office procedure. Each year he took students to Sioux

City businesses to watch employees in action. He remembers seeing computers in businesses in the 1970's that required large amounts of space.

Mr. Yockey supervised the students who created the yearbooks. It was tedious work until modern technology simplified the process. The students helped Mr. Yockey cut pictures to a specific size that would be suitable for publishing. Students typed captions for the pictures on typewriters and pasted or taped them under each photograph. The former owner of *The Moville Record*,

Kent Baker, was the editor of the yearbook during his junior and senior year of high school.

His retirement party was at The First Edition restaurant in Sioux City in 1998. He received a large wall clock as a retirement gift, and he still uses it.

He has had a far-reaching influence on hundreds of students in his career. Some students became attorneys, physicians and accountants. Mr. Yockey reflected on the moments in life where he has
