Minden is committed to the mission and intent of the Fair Housing Ace to provide fair and equal housing opportunities for all. Mayor Zimmerman signed the proclamation at the council's request.

Maggle Burger with Speer Financial services introduced herself and explained to the council what services she could provide the city regarding financial planning. Since the tornado the council has been looking for all ways to bring the city back to its original form and create more opportunities. One of the directions is to add an additional TIF area, which Maggie could help with. There is no upfront cost for the service and will only be billed as service is rendered. NOTICE OF PROPOSED ACTION TO INSTITUTE PROCEEDINGS TO ENTER INTO A LOAN AND DISBURSEMENT AGREEMENT IN A PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$625,000 (WATER REVENUE) City Council of the City of The Minden, Iowa, will meet on April 22, 2025, at the Minden City Hall, in the City, at 6 o'clock p.m., for the purpose of instituting proceedings and taking action to enter into a loan and disbursement agreement (the "Agreement") and to borrow money thereunder in a principal amount not to exceed \$625,000, for the purpose of paying the cost, to that extent, of planning, designing and constructing improvements and extensions to the Municipal Waterworks Utility System (the "Utility") of the City.

a general obligation of the City, nor will it be payable in any manner by taxation, but together with any additional obligations of the City as may be hereafter issued and outstanding from time to time ranking on a parity therewith, will be payable and only from the Net Rev of the Utility.
