### Ag Secretary Mike Naig gets taste of sweetness at local stop

Staff at Boernsen Bees Honey House in Ocheyedan were buzzing when Iowa Agriculture Secretary Mike Naig made a visit to the local facility last Tuesday. He was on his annual 99-county tour throughout Iowa and made local visits to Boern-Solsma's Punkin Patch & Fireworks between Sanborn and Sheldon, plus Cherokee and Sioux County stops.

Naig was also promoting the Choose Iowa program, whose vision is to connect consumers to Iowa produce and food products and expand markets for the state's farmers.

"With Choose Iowa, we are establishing an easily recognizable brand that can be used by farmers, producers, processors, farmers markets, grocery stores, restaurants and many others in the supply chain to connect directly with consumers," said Naig. "Choose Iowa combines the prestige of Iowa's global agricultural reputation with the entrepreneurial ingenuity that exists in all 99 counties."

Boernsen Bees started 21 years ago when Marlene and husband Larry Boernsen decided they wanted to implement honey into their family's diet as a healthier option for their five children.

Larry had been working for a gentleman from Fostoria who had bees. Boernsen Bees Honey was soon founded and the business has been buzzing forward ever since.

Marlene, daughters-inlaw Mara Boernsen and Jill Boernsen, and parttime worker Brian Jack, showed Naig and District 3 Senator Lynn Evans the honey pro-

tles) that make for different honey flavors. She noted that bees especially favor white, purple and yellow blossoms.

Her business began with two colonies that brought 100 pounds of honey to the Clay County Fair that first fall. Now Boernsen Bees monitors 400 hive locations within a 50-mile radius of Ochevedan.

The beekeeper noted this year's honey crop is lower due to the constant rains at the first part of the season.

Marlene has gradually acquired more equipment over the years and expanded her production space on her property just a block east of Main Street.

Products currently offered by the Honey House include flavored soda, lotions, lip balm, honey sticks, Christmas ornaments, candles, creamed honey flavors and much more.

A recent venture for Marlene has been Boernsen's Bee & Bee which is located just a block south of the
