Cherokee County murder case moved to Woodbury County

CHEROKEE, Iowa — The trial for a Cherokee man charged with causing the death of his 4-month-old son will take place in Woodbury County.

District Judge Adam Miller on Thursday ordered the trial to take place in Sioux City. A different judge had previously granted a defense request to move the trial from Cherokee County. Prosecutors did not resist the motion.

A trial date will be set at a later date.

the infant's May death. Defense attorney Bassel El-Kasaby, of Omaha, had sought the change of venue, saying extensive media coverage of the case made it unlikely Contreras-Deciga could receive a fair trial in Cherokee County because it would be hard to pick an impartial jury. Other locations discussed as possible sites for the trial were Kossuth County and counties in the vicinity of Des Moines and

Council Bluffs. By moving the trial to Woodbury County, the case remains in the 3rd Judicial District.

According to court documents, the child was found unresponsive May 8 in a Cherokee home while in Contreras-Deciga's care. The infant was flown to Children's Hospital and Medical Center in Omaha, where medical staff observed his injuries and suspected he had suffered abusive trauma. Medical imaging revealed severe hemorrhaging in the infant's brain, no brain function, retinal hemorrhaging, an ear bruise and a fractured rib.

The child died four days

later at the hospital.

An autopsy ruled the boy's death a homicide resulting from blunt-force head injuries.

In an interview with authorities, Contreras-Deciga said the infant was in his care when he became unresponsive. Contreras-Deciga said he then violently shook the boy while asking him what he needed. He then called the infant's mother and asked her to call 911, court documents said.

Contreras-Deciga was arrested Dec. 9. If found guilty of first-degree murder, he'd face a mandatory sentence of life in prison without parole.
