More buildings on Main downed

Main Street of Sioux Rapids is looking bleak after two more buildings on the north side were taken down on Monday and Tuesday this week.

For local historians, the loss has put another dent in Sioux Rapids' history.

Sioux Rapids is the oldest town in Buena Vista County. These buildings represented years of hard work and sweat equity.

On Monday, the first building was razed and had been the home of Edge Boutique, until the flood

totally devastated it. Many remember the Coast to Coast store that once did business there. Research shows that at one time, the public library was housed on the second floor.

The owner is undecided as to when or how Edge Boutique store-front will be back in operation.

The corner building recently housed an upstairs apartment with a small return bottle business at street level, but it had once been a car dealership and a grocery store. Another piece of the Sioux Rapids legacy is gone.

There may be a building and a small business coming to that corner location soon.
