There is a second "Black Page" time in the Bible. Jesus is 12 years old,





Time for rebuke?

HALLELUJAH

As Jesus responds to His grumbling and ridiculing critics, He uses humor with dramatic word pictures about stumbling stones and millstones. The consequences of sin and of causing others to sin point to the reality of eternal punishment. Then He makes it personal.

In Luke 17.3-4 He says, "Pay attention to yourselves!

If your brother sins, rebuke him; and if he repents, forgive him; and if he sins against you seven times in the day, and turns to you seven times, saying, 'I repent,' you must forgive him." Is it time for you to forgive?

Jesus warns and instructs not only those who cause others to sin, but to those who sin against others. His disciples are to be contrary to the world. They will forgive.

How many times? Up to seven? Understanding the Bible "literally" does not mean slavishly wooden literal. It means understanding according to the normal use of language in the literary genre. Any special use of language would be explained elsewhere in Scripture. A "literal" understanding means the way it was written and spoken by the original hearers.

SEVEN

So "seven times" actually understates the reality of Jesus' words. In Matthew 18, Simon Peter thought the Jewish idea of forgiving three times was going the extra mile, but Jesus said not seven but 77 times! So actually, we're not to count at all.

Matthew 18 also clarifies that you are to go alone to the one who has sinned against you, and reason with him. Because ordinarily, Jesus' followers simply forgive one another, as "Love covers a multitude of sins." But there's an aspect of people not realizing their grievous sins, and needing to be restored to right fellowship with others. Isn't that what you'd want?

It gets tricky. Does it mean that you only forgive if they repent? Are you obligated to forgive someone who sins against you if they do not repent of their sin? Problem is, many times people don't know they've offended, and some people are offended by the slightest things that no one could possibly avoid offending them if they didn't know. Complicated?

Trigger words, masks, memes, micro-aggressions, almost anything can offend someone.

Why is the world so offended by everything, except what God calls sin? That's the real issue. Pharisees were offended at what Jesus did and said, and what He didn't. Had to be their way.

Jesus says, "Pay attention to yourselves!" You have the Scriptures, God's written-down words, to trust and obey. Don't be sinning. Don't be causing others to sin. Don't be holding grudges Forgive, just as you pray, "forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors."

"The obligation to forgive even when a brother sins repeatedly is based on the reality that God has forgiven us a massive debt that we can never repay," Sproul observed. In Matthew 18 Jesus tells a powerful parable about a man forgiven unimaginable debt who refused to forgive another who owed him a pittance. Is that how you do things? Demanding your due?

FORGIVE

"An unforgiving quarrelsome spirit is the mark of an unregenerate heart," Ryle noted. "But who does not know that pride, haughtiness, high-mindedness, readiness to take offense and implacable determination never to forget and never to forgive, are common among men and women who go to the Lord's Table?" Such things should not be.

"Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you" (Eph 4.32). How do you respond to all this? Perhaps as the apostles said to Jesus in Luke 17.5, "Increase our faith!" It is indeed a tall order to be a trusting follower of the Lord Jesus Christ.

RESOURCES

Helpful books apply the Scriptures to our lives, including "Resolving Everyday Conflicts" and "If You Bite And Devour One Another," especially recommended for church leaders to work out in their lives as they influence the other sheep in Christ's flock.

Because Jesus gives His disciples all they need, through the word and the Spirit. He tells us what to do, and He gives us the how to and the want to (Philippians 2.12-16). When we don't do what He lovingly instructs us and equips us, what then? Consequences.

This takes us back to the beginning of Luke 17, and the millstones and the stumbling stones. Temptations to sin are sure to come. "Pay attention to yourselves!" Your faith will increase as you trust and obey. Because it's the work of the Spirit within you!
