Elementary School Days at East Union

Back in the 1970s when I went to elementary school, there were two centers. One was in Arispe, and the other in Lorimor, and each building was a former high school building. I went to Arispe for grades 2-6, and that old building had its advantages.

First, the building itself. It was two stories. The second-grade classes were on the first floor. and we never got to venture up those stairs until we reached third grade. Some of the rooms in the upper story had doors opening to a fire escape, which, of course, were strictly off limits, but on the last day of school, the teacher might open the door and let us go down the stairs. The classrooms were heated by radiators, which was a great way to dry out gloves and mittens in wintertime.

The gymnasium was glorious, and street shoes were absolutely forbidden! There was a stage we could use for Christmas concerts and a balcony where the upper grades sat during school assemblies (anyone remember Al Bell?) It's hard to imagine adults actually letting us kids go up to that balcony, but no one fell off that I remember. Apparently, in its high school days basketball games happened there, but I have no idea where the crowd sat. There was no room on the gym floor; maybe everybody sat on the balcony.

The school grounds were pretty spacious compared to what kids probably have today. There long school bus rides, walks to the Lorimor park, trips to Sweets Grocery store for candy, or big playgrounds. The building was eventually torn down, and now I can hardly tell where it even was. All traces of it seem to be gone. Even the big tree in the front of the building is gone. It's a shame.

East Union High School and Elementary School are consolidated in one location now. I guess that is progress, but those old buildings were great while they lasted.

We didn't have school buses running all over town back then. The town kids would walk to the "old primary building" where the buses would pick them up and deliver them to their schools. I lived where my dad still lives, only three blocks away, and I walked each morning until I started riding with my friend's mom out to the middle school. Mom probably walked with me the first day or maybe even a week, but after that, I walked by myself and even crossed the highway with the old mobile stop signs that the school (probably Mrs. Lucille Jones) rolled out into the highway each morning and afternoon.

I hope to see a lot of people Saturday. Just come for an hour or two or make a weekend of it. You may see someone you haven't in a long time.
