ily, but I had never been further west than Colorado, so I was excited to finally travel to California and later on to Oregon and Washington," Judy recalled.

In Bremer, Wash., the couple lived in a rented house while Bob worked in the Naval Shipyard along with civilian employees rehabbing ships and making them seaworthy again.

"During that time, I applied and was hired to teach a third grade class there in Bremerton," Judy said. "Our first daughter, blue-eyed Cathy, was born in the Naval Hospital there.

"After our 2 and a half years in Washington, we traveled back to Iowa, where Bob enrolled at Iowa State University to get his Mechanical Engineering degree," she said. "We lived in married student housing, barracks type housing built after WWII to house the returning married GIs. We lived there for another two and a half years until Bob had completed his course work and graduated. By then, we had added brown-eyed Ann Elizabeth to our family.

"We lived for a time in Bettendorf, where Bob worked for Iowa/Illinois Gas and Electric, but after one and a half years decided we wanted to live closer to family. We purchased our family home in Atlantic in 1965 and lived there for many years. It was here that we were joined by our third daughter, Jennifer.

"During that time, I developed a passion for gardening," she said. "I went through the Master Gardener's program, which required, among other things, 40 hours (if I remember correctly) working on community projects. At that time my mother-in-law was a resident of Heritage House, so I chose to rehabilitate the gardens behind that facility. Together with two other faithful volunteers, we continued to maintain that garden for a number of years."

"My husband was always interested in organizations," Judy said. "He joined and was very active in Chamber of Commerce and Rotary. He liked to be in a position to be able to make Atlantic better. He wanted to bring jobs here, and served on committees that could do that. Throughout his working career he tried to be helpful to the town."

Bob passed away in November of 2023.

"If he were here today and could see how people have taken up his dream and are carrying it on, he would be happy and proud!" said Judy. "I would like to give a shout out to Christina Bateman, a realtor, wife and mother. She and so many others who love Atlantic have also taken up the effort. We will soon have a beautiful Child Development Center and many new homes along the east side of Olive Street, as well as new businesses. Our town is doing well!"
