GLENWOOD: Discrepancies over future road repairs and a lack of early input have led Mills County officials to object to a proposed annexation by Council Bluffs in the county's northwest corner. By a 2-0 vote at its recent meeting, the County Board of Supervisors approved a resolution of non-support for the city's proposal to annex roughly 473 acres between Pottawattamie and Mills County, extending from the current city limits down to the Interstate 29-Bunge Avenue interchange. Two proposed developments near the interchange, including the Cattlemen's Heritage beef processing plant project, had requested voluntary annexation to allow the city to provide the necessary water and sewer infrastructure.

RED OAK: Recently, Summit Carbon Solutions paused its permit application in South Dakota for its proposed Midwest Express CO2 pipeline. Earlier this month, South Dakota Gov. Larry Rhoden signed a bill banning the use of eminent domain for construction of CO2 pipelines. Montgomery County resident Jan Norris is one the project's more vocal critics and at last week's Supervisors meeting said Summit may explore three possible alternatives as a result of the recent South Dakota developments: "One, a new route avoiding South Dakota could be sought, such as going around through other states - like across Nebraska, or


up through Minnesota; two, the U.S. Congress could circumvent state law; or three, they could comply, and develop a 100 percent voluntary route across South Dakota."


ATLANTIC: Cass County officials are among those taking the next steps after voters declared emergency medical services essential. While some counties look to ramp up or re-group in southwest Iowa on making EMS essential, Cass County voters overwhelmingly supported an essential service resolution in November 2024, with over 76 percent of the vote in favor. Under a 2021 state law, counties can implement a tax levy of up to 75 cents per thousand dollars valuation and an income surtax to finance EMS agencies within the coun-

RED OAK: The Red Oak City Council unanimously approved the second reading of an updated solid waste collecinstead implementing the fee to fund city-wide cleanup days.

tion ordinance, which primarily implements a \$4 fee on residents' water bills with the proceeds going towards costs for at least one annual citywide cleanup day, reduces the number of days to accumulate trash from 30 to 14 days, and creates a garbage collector permit process and fee. The ordinance comes as the culmination of months of debate on whether the city should move towards a curbside municipal service--

(Continued From Page ???) the Iowa House, the chamber passed the 2025 bill in a 84-11 vote in late March.

Peter Bengtson, the father of Ellen Bengtson, who was killed by a distracted driver while biking in 2020, said that the years of the bill failing to advance felt like a "kick to the gut," but that the law being signed Wednesday was a "good first step" toward preventing distracted driving deaths. He said the law will allow law enforcement officers to start educating and informing people about the dangers of using phones while driving, and is an important start in stopping preventable deaths on Iowa roads.


law, which the Iowa Legislature passed in 2023, prohibits school libraries from providing books deemed not age appropriate and primarily focuses on any book that includes "sex
