70 Years Ago

November 1955

Last Saturday more than 100 Dowling High School boys from Des Moines came to Bayard where they picked 350 bushels of corn on the James H Murrane and Paul Murrane farms. They received 50 cents a bushel for the corn and all proceeds were donated to the "Harvest of Hope" campaign for the Crippled Children's Society of Iowa.

Two Polk county deputy sheriffs escorted the boys to Bayard. They came in a school bus and a caravan of about 15 cars driven by members of the Dowling Dad's club. They received instruction from James H Murrane before they went to the fields.

Voters in the Bagley Independent school district gave approval to bond the district in the amount of \$12,500 to rebuild and modernize the athletic field. Almost 70 percent of the votes cast were in favor of the proposal as 222 voted yes and only 100 opposed it. The election was last Thursday.

Land adjacent to the present athletic field will be bought and then the enlarged field will be leveled and seeded. Lights for football and baseball will be added.

Last Thursday evening 422 cash customers plus 37 cooks passed through the food line at the Smorgasbord at the Bagley Methodist church. And, if anyone failed to get his fill of good food it was his own fault because there appeared to be literally tons of delicious and tasty morsels.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service sponsored the Smorgasbord with Mrs Emmett Cain and Mrs Verne Brobst acting as the committee in charge. Mrs George Windebank of Perry supervised the entire undertaking.

Salk vaccine in 1954 was proved 60 to 90 percent effective and since then it has been increased in potency. This means possibly an even higher percentage of protection was given those who received at least two shots before the 1955 polio season. Getting your shots is very important.
