



Horse Arena springs back to life

On a sunny Sunday after- upgrades. Planned improvenoon, the Cherokee Downtown Arena echoed once again with the sounds of energy and purpose—not from hooves or cheering crowds, but from rakes, shovels, and the laughter of volunteers. This Spring Clean-Up Day marked a new chapter for the historic arena of 20+ years as a newly appointed committee stepped forward to restore the beloved facility after flood damage in 2024.

Approved by the City of Cherokee, the new Downtown Arena Committee is made up of passionate community members determined to bring the arena back to its full potential. Their mission is clear: to reestablish the Cherokee Downtown Arena as one of Northwest Iowa's premier equine event destinations.

Originally built in the early 2000s, the arena was the result of a collaborative effort between like-minded individuals and generous local businesses who envisioned a space where rodeos, barrel races, and horse shows could thrive. Now, 20 years later, the facility is in need of essential

ments include restoring electricity, replacing the arena's footing with fresh sand for safer riding conditions, and investing in updated equipment such as new speakers and roping chutes. Thanks to the support of communityminded businesses like Back Electric, who restored the power, and LG Everist, who generously donated new sand from a local pit, some of these improvements are already underway.

The committee is committed to preserving this important venue for future generations, but these upgrades come with significant upfront costs. While the arena will be self-sustaining through rental income from hosted events. we're asking for help from the community to meet these initial expenses. If you're able, please consider making a donation—every contribution, big or small, brings us one step closer to revitalizing this space for all to enjoy.

The clean-up on April 13th was just the first step. Volunteers tackled debris left behind by last year's floodwaters, scrubbed the grounds, and began assessing areas in need of repair. The atmosphere was upbeat, as many recognized that this work not only revives the facility, but also revitalizes community

Committee members emphasized the economic impact the arena can have on Cherokee. With each equine event hosted, a wave of contestants and spectators is expected to visit—bringing foot traffic to gas stations, restaurants, shops, and other local businesses.

As plans move forward, the committee is excited to unveil a schedule of events designed to celebrate the arena's comeback and reintroduce it to the public. From competitive rodeo events to youth riding clinics and family-friendly gatherings, the arena's future is already taking shape.
