"We have a pretty crazy schedule and it doesn't always happen, but we try to make meals and sit together at the table to eat them. My mom was a really good cook and I miss being able to call her to ask how to make certain things.

"I am very thankful for all she taught me...especially in the kitchen. We love her Saucy Little Meatballs" and "Fried potatoes" and make this meal frequently."

These are the McCollums' favorite recipes:

Meatballs

11/2 lb. ground beef 3/4 c. oatmeal 3/4 c. milk

1 egg 1/2 tbsp. onion flakes Salt and pepper Sauce

1 c. ketchup 3 tbsp. brown sugar 3 tbsp. mustard

Mix all of the ingredients together and shape into balls. Brown both sides of the meatballs and then put in a 9x13 inch baking dish. Mix sauce ingredients together and spread over meatballs. Bake for 45 minutes at 350 degrees. We usually pair these with fried potatoes.

Fried Potatoes

3/4 to 1 lb. of potatoes 1 onion 1 stick of butter Lawry's seasoning Slice and boil the potatoes Shredded colby jack cheese

until they are fork tender. While they are boiling, thinly slice the onion and saute it in the 1/2 of the butter until the onion is almost translucent. Once potatoes are cooked, drain thoroughly. Add/melt the remainder of the butter and put potatoes in with onion/butter. Season with Lawry's and fry on both sides until they are brown and crispy. (Don't over flip/stir).

Breakfast pizza

This is one of our family's favorite weekend breakfasts that is also great to make ahead and eat for breakfast throughout the week. Pack of 2 Mama Mia Pizza

1 jar of Ragu cheese sauce 1 bag of hashbrowns from refrigerator section 2 lb. of bacon 8 eggs

Spread cheese sauce on each crust. (I typically don't use the entire jar)

Cook hashbrowns until

Scramble the eggs

Layer each crust with sauce, hashbrowns, half the bacon, and half the scrambled eggs. Top with shredded cheese and bake for 10 minutes at
