

## 100+ Years

January 7, 1926

Bert Hamilton and son, Carl, were at Ames, January 1st, attending the big boys and girls meeting held at the Iowa State College. At this time, gold medals were distributed to the boys and girls of each county who had champion baby beeves last year. Carl was one of the lucky ones who was awarded a medal. The medals were the gift of the Chicago Commission and the Chicago Livestock Association. Carl was one of the 54 boys in the state to receive this honor. Last year was Carl's first effort in the baby beef business and he was handsomely rewarded for his effort. He and his sister were both showing winners in the calf clubs. This year, Carl will have three baby beeves to show, but his sister will not go after the prizes. She will assist her mother with the chickens.

Haggai Lodge No. 369 A.F. & A.M. held their regular meeting Tuesday evening at their hall, and following the business meeting, new officers were inducted into office. Past Master, R. E. C. D. Plumley, the popular auctioneer of near Ralston, met with a serious accident Monday night and is now in the hospital at Carroll, where he was taken Tuesday so that he might receive proper care and attention. As we have the story, Monday evening Mr. Plumley opened the tank on a pressure lamp to give it some needed adjustments. The tank being pumped up, the gas was immediately sprayed all over the room, and ignited from the kitchen stove. Mr. Plumley was badly burned about the hands and face, and his son, Leland also received some bad burns when assisting his father to extinguish the blaze. Dr. D. H. Hopkins was called and rendered what medical aid he could at the time, and on Tuesday, Mr. Plumley was taken to Carroll, where he can have the attention of a nurse. At last reports, he was in a serious condition, and it is hoped we will have better news soon. Fortunately, the house did not burn, though it must have been a close call.

The many friends of Perry Goes were greatly shocked last week when they learned of the death of this promising young farmer. Although he had been ailing for quite a number of weeks, many of his friends and acquaintances failed to realize his critical condition. Death occurred at his home, Wednesday, Dec. 31. Just a little over a year ago, Mr. Goes was married to Miss May Peters, and they took possession of his father's farm, the latter retiring and locating in Lidderdale. During our short acquaintance with Mr. Goes, we found him, as did all of his acquaintances, a likeable young man with bright prospects ahead for the future. The following obituary has been furnished us: Perry Goes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Goes, was born near Glidden, Iowa, May 4, 1901. He was baptized in St. John's Lutheran Church on June 16, 1901, and remained a member until death. When about three years, old his parents moved to southern Illinois, but in less than two years, they returned again to their former home, where he has lived ever since. On September 10, 1924, he and May Peters were joined in holy wedlock, after which his parents soon moved to Lidderdale, and he took charge of his father's farm. He had been ailing since early last spring, enduring much pain at times, undergoing several operations on his throat and neck, and later heart trouble also set in, keeping him confined to his bed for about a month before he died. He reached the age of 24 years, 7 months, and 27 days. His wife and parents, many relatives and friends mourn his early departure. The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, Jan. 3, at St. John's Lutheran Church, conducted by Rev. B. Reck. Interment being made in the Glidden Cemetery.

A seven passenger Chalmers touring car loaded with ten young people from the locality of Jefferson, on their way to Scranton to attend the theatre Sunday night, ran into J. B. Truesdell's big 5-ton truck, loaded, on the Lincoln highway 4 1/2 miles east of Scranton. The incident happened near the home of Earl Smith, at 8:00 o'clock Sunday evening. Seven of the young people were injured, some more than others. Drs. Arthur Parry, Presnell, and Jackson were called, and the Slinger ambulance called, and the four most badly injured taken to Dr. Jackson's office at Jefferson. Mr. Truesdell had burned out a bearing on the truck as he was returning home to Glidden from Illinois, and he had gone to the Smith home to call for help to get the truck off the Lincoln Highway, as there was so much heavy traffic. It had only been in the road a few minutes when along came the touring car, smashing into the truck sidewise. The touring car was badly smashed in the right side. Miss Potter and Glen Frankhouser were more seriously hurt than the other five, who were badly cut, bruised and shocked by the accident. A granddaughter of Chas. M. Griffiee, Vera Potter, of Jefferson, was most seriously injured. She was a former Ralston resident. The truck was knocked into the ditch from the collision, which would indicate that someone must have been stepping a trifle heavy on the gas, as trucks of this size are not shoved around without some little effort. We have not heard whether any attempt will be made to place the blame on Mr. Truesdell or not. We understand he attempted to get help from passing motorists, all of whom stepped on the gas and got by as quickly as possible, no doubt being fearful of a hold-up, since so many robberies are planned and carried out in this manner. At last report, no deaths

had resulted from the accident.

## 75+ Years

December 21, 1950

Funeral rites for Andrew J. Quigg, 69, who died in St. Anthony's Hospital at Carroll on Wednesday of last week were held in the Huffman Funeral Home in Glidden on Friday at 2:30. Rev. H. H. Proett of Sioux Rapids officiated at the service. The Masonic service was also given. Music for the services was furnished by a quartet composed of W. L. McLaughlin, Harry Copenhaver, C.M. Roberts, and A. G. Redmond. Mrs. Earl Sherfield was the accompanist. Burial was made in Westlawn Cemetery. Mr. Quigg came to Glidden in 1913 and engaged in the hardware business which he disposed of to A. E. Hofstad when his health prevented his carrying on the business. Mr. Quigg, born May 5, 1881, at Conshohocken, Pa., was 2 years old when he came to Iowa. He had attended high school and college. He had been a resident of Glidden since 1913, having been in the hardware business here for 35 years. He was married on August 14, 1907, in College Springs, Iowa, to Myrtle Dunbar who survives. Surviving are his wife, a son, Doyle D. Quigg of Ann Arbor, Mich., two brothers, and one sister. Two sisters and one brother are deceased. Mr. Quigg was a member of the Methodist Church and Haggai Lodge A.F. & A. M. of Glidden.

William Bartholow, 76, died about 5:30 Sunday morning at the Knute Nursing Home here after a year's illness. Funeral services were held at 1:30 p.m. at Huffman Funeral Home in Glidden with the Rev. Waldo Seawell, pastor of the Friends' Church officiating. Burial was in Westlawn Cemetery. The casket bearers were Herbert Trafford, W. A. Willison, Harry Epperly, Boyd Braden, Jake Peters, and Kenneth Sherer. Mr. Bartholow was born Nov. 17, 1874, in Greene County, Iowa, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmond Bartholow of Churdan. He had lived in the Glidden community for 25 years. Surviving is one nephew, Dwight Lewis of Mantorville, Minnesota. Mr. Bartholow was unmarried.

Several Glidden football players have been honored recently by the coaches of Northwest Iowa. As well, the Wildcat team was chosen the top Class A team in NW Iowa by the coaches. Mark McCrea was named NW Iowa "Player of the Year" in Class A, and Mike Fairchild was named outstanding defensive lineman. Both of these players were also named to the All-NW Iowa teams, McCrea on offense and Fairchild on defense. Curt Douglas was also named at safety to the All NW-Iowa defensive team and Brian

Johnson at quarterback on the offensive unit. No other team had four players named to the "all" teams.

Brian Johnson, Glidden senior and quarterback of the 1975 state champion Wildcats, has signed a letter of intent to attend Iowa State University. He signed the letter Tuesday evening after the Guthrie Center basketball game. Johnson was given a "full-ride" scholarship at ISU, meaning generally that all expenses are paid. Athletic officials there indicate they plan to use him at quarterback or on defense. Several other Glidden athletes have also been contacted by colleges both in and out of state, however no others have announced a choice to date. Johnson is the son of Supt. and Mrs. Dale Johnson of Glidden.
