Red Rock Men donate to Awakening Grace

100+ Men Red Rock donated \$10,000 to Awakening Grace, one of the organization's 2025 first quarter recipients. Radio funding dispute can be solved

The Marion County E911 Board sent a message to Sheriff Jason Sandholdt on March 6 that included an invoice for the balance of radios purchased. Emergency Management Director Jeff Anderson wrote the message on the board's behalf, requesting that the sheriff's office pay the balance from the department's current budget or otherwise make arrangements through the Board of Supervisors or provide a plan of action or provide a reason why "you feel that you don't need to pay it."

The balance owed E911 is reported to be around \$40,000. Sandholdt wrote in a response dated March 26 that the radios were part of his 23-24 budget. Since the money was not spent, he believes the money was returned to the general fund and earmarked for that purpose.

"The BOS will need to be petitioned to pay for it from the money that was returned to them by me from my last year's budget and discussed with the past Board Chair," Sandholdt wrote. The past Board Chair was Mark Raymie, who was not reelected to another term.

At the 911 Service Board meeting last week, the board directed me to send the invoice (attached) for the radio project to you.
