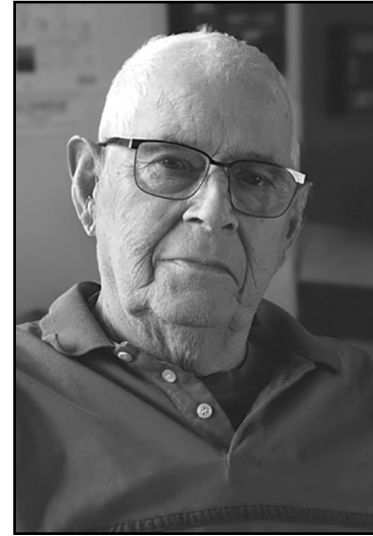


# OBITUARY

### Local nonprofits receive over \$390,000!

Clayton County Foundation for the Future endowments grant out largest amount ever, a 13% increase over 2025.

Nonprofits across Clayton County are receiving critical funding this month thanks to more than \$390,000 in grants from the endowment funds hosted by the Clayton County Foundation for the Future.

"The Foundation is here for our community now and forever, and the organizations receiving these grants are our partners. They help us understand local needs and drive lasting change to ensure all people can thrive," says Emily Sadewasser, the Foundation's executive director. "Endowments provide a sustainable source of funding that allows organizations to realize their missions, embark on new initiatives to meet local needs, and do their best work to support communities."

The family of funds hosted by the Foundation will grant a total of \$390,160 – dollars that organizations can rely on annually for operations, community projects, and many other aspects of their work.

The endowment funds held by the Foundation award grants every spring. This year's total amount represents a 13% – or \$46,330– increase over last year.
