**Legal Notice**  
City of Clarence-Mowing of Properties

52.01 MOWING OF PROPERTIES: Any property within the City, including residential, commercial, or industrial zoned districts, is required to be mowed any time the vegetation (grass and weeds) reaches a height of more than eight (8) inches. The property owner and occupant are also jointly and severally responsible for mowing the abutting space between the lot line and the curb line or edge of the traveled portion of the street right-of-way and one-half of any alley abutting the property.

52.02 VIOLATION: Violation of this chapter will be determined by visual observation and measurement. When a violation has occurred, the City will serve notice upon the owner, owner's agent, or occupant of the property to abate the nuisance by posting the notice in a conspicuous place upon the premises where the nuisance exists.

52.03 NOTICE: The notice shall set forth that the property owner, owner's agent, or occupant of the property has a specified and reasonable amount of time which shall be no less than 48 hours and no longer than 96 hours to have the vegetation cut so that the height conforms with this chapter. The notice shall set forth the address of the property in question and shall instruct the property owner that the notice constitutes notice for the balance of the mowing season and that further action will be taken by the City to remedy the problem if it occurs again on the same property without additional written notice being given.

52.04 FAILURE TO COMPLY: If the property owner fails to cut the vegetation so that it conforms with this chapter within the time period set forth in the notice, the City may cause the vegetation to be cut and the cost of this action will be assessed against the property. The fee for this service will be set by resolution.

52.05 PUBLICATION OF NOTICE: Annual spring publication of the ordinance codified in this chapter in an official newspaper shall serve as notice to property owners. The City is authorized to respond to violations without additional written notice.

52.06 EXCEPTIONS: This chapter pertains to all residential, business and industrial land within the City limits but excludes agricultural land within the City.

Policy highlighted the complexity of cancer and the challenges involved in identifying its causes.

The Agricultural Health Study included more than 89,000 farmers and their spouses from Iowa and North Carolina. Participants included more than 31,000 private pesticide applicators, 4,900 commercial applicators, and nearly 21,000 spouses. Over a 10 year period, farmers in the study experienced 13% fewer cancers than expected compared to the general population, while spouses experienced 10 percent fewer cancers than expected compared to others in Iowa.

More than 80 percent of Iowa pesticide applicators chose to participate in the study. Researchers noted that farmers are particularly valuable participants because they can accurately report pesticide use and are exposed to higher levels through mixing, loading, and application. The findings suggest that pesticide use among these farmers does not increase their likelihood of developing cancer. Researchers continue to examine other possible contributing factors, including lifestyle. The University of Iowa study found that Iowans rank among the highest in binge drinking, obesity, and low vegetable consumption, all of which are associated with increased cancer risk.

Last year, the legislature allocated one million dollars to the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics to support further research and develop policy recommendations. An initial report was released in February, and a final report is expected in June 2026 with additional data. These findings will help guide future decisions as the state works to improve public health and strengthen its health care system.

possibly the most draconian budget cuts in Cedar county history for the 2026-2027 fiscal year beginning July 1. This is what you get when your governor decides to cap your property taxes at 2% and instead of fighting it, the board enacts it in your own neighborhood as if it was already approved.

Here are just some of the cuts calculated from Sue Hall's reporting in the Tipton Conservative:

- \$36,375 from the libraries
- \$2,200 from the Senior Dining Center (these meals are also home delivered)
- \$4,242 from River Bend Transit (door to door rides for the elderly, disabled and general public)
- \$4,000 from the Historical Society (zero it out, Kaufmann said)
- \$7,500 from the Cedar County Fair Association
- \$100,000 from the Sheriff's Department (by withdrawing the request for two new vehicles)
- \$26,000 from the Conservation Department
- A freeze on county employee salaries while more duties are added
- Environmental and Zoning Department combined with the Public Health Department, leaving one E&Z employee.

This last is particularly egregious because they are losing an employee, a department and they don't yet know who will do all the septic, well, building and sanitation inspections. Soon to retire E&Z Director Phil LaRue pointed out at a meeting that work done by noncounty personnel loses accountability and control. Still the board is going ahead with web-based permitting which will cost money before it "pays for itself".

Linn County has 230,000 residents and three county su-

pervisors. They are learning life skills such as leadership and cooperation through the same values of Head, Hands, Heart and Health that she helped pioneer over a century ago. In Iowa, nearly 100,000 youth are involved in 4-H. Jessie was part of a lasting legacy that is forever honored in the 4-H creed, "I pledge my head to clearer thinking, my heart to greater loyalty, my hands to larger service, and my health to better living for my club, my community, my country and my world."
