7. DISCUSSION/ACTION ITEMS:
7.a ORD 770 Amending Chapter 77 Motorized Scooters, Electric Bicycles and Other Personal Transport Vehicles (First Reading)
Aaron Lincoln overviewed the ordinance, he discussed the various kinds of devices and the categories designated for each type. There will be age restrictions, single rider restrictions, age restrictions, yielding the right-of-way, helmet requirements, restricts on what public property they can be driven on, lighting and brake requirements, stipulations for reckless or improper riding, and enforcement and penalties.
A chart in the draft ordinances showing the devices, motor power, design speed, age restriction, and place(s) of operation was reviewed by the City Council and staff. There was an extended discussion which included the following:
Ensuring compliance with ADA requirements for certain types of devices.
Enforcement of speeds using radar.
Increasing the age requirement for low-speed and mid-range e-scooters. How enforcement would occur.
Whether we would require the devices to be registered.
That many citizens have brought this concern to City Council members and other cities are working to find a solution.
Where various device types are allowed to be ridden.
The consensus was to increase the age for Class 1 and Class 2 devices (Low-speed and Mid-Range E-Scooters) and to implement a registration system.
Sarah Kleber, City Attorney, suggested that due to the proposed changes, the first reading of the ordinance could occur at their March 31st Special Meeting.
No action was taken, the first reading of the ordinance will be on the City Council agenda for March 31st.
7.b Presentation of Annual Report From Safe Routes to School/Complete Streets Committee Dawn Kimmel, SIMPCO and member of the Complete Streets & Safe Routes to School Committee, provided a list of 2025 Accomplishments for the State Routes to School/Complete Street Coalition and reviewed some highlights. The annual sidewalk inspections were done, resulting in 204 letters being sent to property owners to address sidewalk compliance, 70 repairs have been documented as complete as of the date of the report. They worked on a pedestrian crossing survey with the School District, 178 people responded with areas of concern. There were 368 feet of residential sidewalk over the last year, and 350 feet of sidewalk have been replaced on 1st Street from Prairie Bluff Drive to Baker Drive. The coalition worked on holding an annual Bike to School Day and Walk to School Day. There was a survey sent to determine how many kids walk to school, currently less than 10% do. The barriers to walking to school included distance and crossing a busy street. There are additional sidewalk inspections planned for this quarter. Other future goals include additional curb cut installations, sidewalk connections at

Jefferson Park, tennis courts, and the dog park at C street and creating a pedestrian crossing from 1st St/S. Lewis Blvd south to Gaul Drive.
Mark Reinders asked about the rule for sidewalk inspections. Council members get asked about this.
Dawn said that the rule is a 3/4 inch gap. The rules are ADA based. Enforcing this can prevent future injuries and address liability concerns.
7.c PROCLAMATION: National Library Week (April 19-25)
Mayor Ron Hanson proclaimed April 19-25th as National Library Week. They will be having a variety of activities at the Library that week.
7.d Approval of Quote for the Playground Equipment Surfacing at the Recreation Complex
Tyler Tweet said that he had brought this quote to the City Council during the budget meetings. He is seeking approval to lock in the price with Play Pro for \$68,642.00.
Aaron Lincoln said the quote we received in a prior year was quite a bit higher.
Tyler said that the prior quote included the swing-set area, this will only be the playground area.
Kirk Moriarty asked about the \$9,100 optional add-on.
Tyler said that would be the concrete border to help with run-off, our Public Works Department will be able to do this.
Motion by Mark Reinders, seconded by Kirk Moriarty to Approve the quote from Play Pro for \$68,642.00.
Motion Carried. [Unanimous]
7.e Approval of Change Order #2 for the First Street Reconstruction Project (IDOT# STP-U-6890-611-70-97)
Aaron Lincoln explained that this is for the 1st Street East project. Once the contractors are substantially complete with the project the IDOT has to go through the quantities with the consultant. This change order will be getting all the quantity changes logged in. The first change order we had removed \$21k when we moved the trail from the north side to the south side of the road which allowed them to not have to mess with the storm sewer intakes on the north side of 1st Street, but this did require them to address some things on the south side which created some cost increase. There was also an extra layer of pavement underneath that our records did not show. This change order is an increase of 56k, we have a number of quantities that are underrunning so when they get their last payment we will not hit the original contract amount, we will be at or below.
Motion by Andrea Johnson, seconded by Shari Zenor Kiple to Approve Change Order #2 for the First Street Reconstruction Project (IDOT# STP-U-6890-611-70-97).

8. ORDINANCE(S):
8.a ORD 771 Amending Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances to Decrease Parks Board Membership (First Reading)
Andrea Johnson explained that awhile back the City Council approved increasing the membership, we are currently having trouble filling the memberships so we cannot get a quorum unless everyone attends. As a result we would like to return to a five member board.
Motion by Kirk Moriarty, seconded by Mark Reinders to Approve ORD

771 Amending Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances to Decrease Parks Board Membership (First Reading). Motion Carried. [Unanimous]
9. ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:
Lincoln said that we will have two Council meetings next week on Tuesday. One meeting will be the levy hearing and the other will be for public hearings for the GO bond. There was a wastewater plant meeting, they are sending out the bid packages for the work that needs to be done. They're looking to have the guaranteed maximum price for the project by June. The activity going on the west side of the Old MCI building is the developer working on adding warehousing, so they are adding a truck ramp on the eastern side.
Jason Kvidera said that the work going on next to Sergeant Bluff Smiles is because there are some shops that will be going in there.
Aaron said that the building going up on Dogwood is a traffic sign and paving painting business. Also at Dogwood the electric conduit will be installed in the next few weeks. Danny Christoffers has been getting inquiries about whether or not the City Council is going to extend the tax abatement program which currently expires on December 31st, we may need to have some discussion at a future meeting to determine the City Council's intention.
10. COUNCIL MEMBER'S COMMENTS:
Andrea Johnson thanked Asst. Chief Rosendahl and Aaron Lincoln for their work on the Scooter ordinance.
Shari Zenor Kiple expressed appreciation to Andrea for her time she

spent on the ordinance as well.
Kirk Moriarty noted that Dan Hospers final day with the Public Works Department was today, he thanked Dan for his years of service with the town. He did an outstanding job with the water plant and pool.
Mark Reinders asked where people will meet for the litter clean up event on April 27th. Tyler Tweet said they will meet at the Recreation Complex.
Mark also asked the Police Chief how we got involved with the St. Patrick's day event over by the Gordon viaduct.
Jereme Muller said that we are part of the Governor's Traffic Safety Board program, we are required to participate in two multi-jurisdictional programs each year.
11. MAYOR'S COMMENTS:
Ron Hanson stated that everyone has done a wonderful job at our City. He welcomed the new Office Manager at the Police Department; Rori Shoulters.
He also noted that regarding the Scooters ordinance, it's for the purpose of providing safety to the community.
